Introduction

Aims of the project

The *Next Step* survey is an annual survey of every student who completed Year 12 in the previous year in Queensland, in Government and non-Government schools. The survey results show the initial study and work destinations of young people after completing school.

The objectives of the survey are to assist:

- parents and the wider public to know the achievements of students and to appreciate the range of options available to students
- schools to review and plan their services for students, especially in the senior years of schooling
- school systems to review their education policies as they affect the transition from school to further study and employment
- training bodies, universities, business and industry, local government and regional planners to plan their services.

The survey follows the destinations of students who completed Year 12 at Government schools, Catholic schools, independent schools and TAFE secondary colleges.

Methodology

The *Next Step* 2008 survey was conducted by the Department of Education, Training and the Arts through the Office of the Government Statistician (OGS), in accordance with the privacy provisions of the *Statistical Returns Act 1896*.

The survey targeted students who completed Year 12 in Queensland in 2007, including students at Government schools, non-Government schools and TAFE secondary colleges. All students who were awarded a Senior Certificate or Certificate of Post-Compulsory School Education (CPCSE) were included. The Senior Certificate is a formal record of achievement issued at the end of Year 12 to all students who complete at least one approved subject. The CPCSE is a separate certificate for students with an impairment or difficulties in learning that are not primarily due to socioeconomic, cultural and/or linguistic factors.

The targeted students were identified by means of a survey frame (or list) provided to the OGS by the Queensland Studies Authority (QSA). This list contained details for 41 889 Year 12 completers who were deemed in-scope for this survey.

The survey was conducted between 2 April and 17 May 2008, approximately six months after the young people left school. This timing was designed to be after tertiary education places for 2008 were accepted, and while most of these young people were still contactable via their 2007 home address details.

Responses were predominantly collected via computer-assisted telephone interviewing (CATI) with paper-based surveys collected from a small number of students for whom telephone details were not available. The average time for a completed interview was less than four minutes.

Prior to the survey, all Year 12 completers were sent a letter from the Queensland Minister for Education and Training advising them of the survey. Those without

usable telephone details but with a usable Australian or international address were sent a printed copy of the questionnaire and a reply paid envelope.

Completed paper-based questionnaires were returned directly to OGS for processing and data entry. All responding Year 12 graduates went into a draw for a chance to win one of several prizes offered as an incentive to encourage survey participation.

At the close of the survey, nearly all non-responding students for whom telephone numbers were available had received at least six attempts of contact. Non-responding students without telephone numbers were mailed two copies of the questionnaire. A total of 33 568 completed surveys were received. Of these, 306 were completed by paper-based questionnaire and 33 262 by CATI.

Regional reports are based on statistical divisions used by the Australian Bureau of Statistics.

The response rate for this region – Fitzroy/Central West – was 79.8 per cent.

Please note that some survey participants did not provide information for particular survey questions. As a result, the number of responses shown in some tables may not reflect the totals reported for the main destinations appearing in Table 2.

Students were allocated to this region on the basis of the location of the school they attended in 2007. A list of schools from this region is shown in the Appendix (Table A1A).

Main Findings – Fitzroy/Central West

Destinations

More than nine in ten (92.2 per cent) Year 12 completers in this region were studying or in paid employment at the time of the survey. (Figure 1)

Almost six in ten (56.4 per cent) continued in some recognised form of education and training in the year after they left school. (Figure 1)

Over a quarter were undertaking a university degree (25.4 per cent). (Figure 1)

More than three in ten (31.0 per cent) were studying vocational education and training (VET). (Figure 1)

Nearly three in ten of the campus-based VET students were studying at Certificate IV level or higher (2.1 per cent of Year 12 completers overall). (Figure 1)

Almost one-quarter (24.4 per cent) were undertaking employment-based training, either as an apprentice (16.7 per cent) or trainee (7.6 per cent). (Figure 1)

In addition to the above study destinations, a further 7.8 per cent of respondents from this region deferred a tertiary offer in 2008 (deferrers are shown in Figure 1 in their actual current destination and in Figure 3 as deferrers).

Over four in ten (43.6 per cent) did not enter post-school education or training and were either employed (35.8 per cent), looking for work (6.4 per cent) or neither working, seeking work or studying (1.5 per cent). (Figure 1)

Learning: education and training destinations

Amongst the 56.4 per cent of Year 12 completers continuing in some form of education or training the most common fields of study were Engineering and Related Technologies, and Management and Commerce (e.g. Business, Tourism). (Table 4)

Central Queensland Institute of TAFE and Central Queensland University were the two tertiary institutions most commonly entered by Year 12 completers, accounting for nearly six in ten of Year 12 completers (56.1 per cent) in post-school education and training destinations. (Table 5)

Earning: employment destinations

Of those young people working, almost four in ten were in part-time employment (38.8 per cent), while 30.1 per cent were in full-time employment, 21.3 per cent were apprentices and 9.8 per cent were trainees. (Table 6)

Over one-half of all Year 12 completers in employment (50.2 per cent) were working in just three occupational groups — Sales Assistants, Clerks, Receptionists and Secretaries, and Food Handlers. Sales Assistants was the most common occupational group (26.2 per cent), with the next most common being Clerks, Receptionists and Secretaries (12.9 per cent), followed by Food Handlers (11.0 per cent). (Table 7)

Not learning or earning

The survey identified 6.4 per cent of Year 12 graduates who were seeking work. (Figure 1)

Less than one in every fifty Year 12 graduates were neither studying nor seeking work (1.5 per cent). This group includes those with a disability or health condition, and those travelling or waiting for their course to commence. (Figure 1)

The key reasons given for not continuing in study were that young people were undecided and considering options, wanted a break from study (for example to travel), or were not interested in further study. (Table 9)

Different people, different pathways

The survey found different patterns for different groups of young people.

Sex

There were differences in the destinations of males and females. In particular:

Females were more likely to enter a university degree course (28.2 per cent compared to 22.2 per cent of males), and more likely to enrol in campus-based (i.e. not apprenticeships or traineeships) VET programs (8.3 per cent compared to 4.7 per cent of males). (Table 2)

Males were nearly twice as likely to enter VET programs as university (39.7 per cent for VET compared to 22.2 per cent for university), while females were more likely to enter university than VET programs (28.2 per cent for university and 23.5 per cent for VET). (Table 2)

Males were seven times as likely as females to enter an apprenticeship, while females were almost three times as likely as males to commence a traineeship. (Table 2)

Females were five times as likely as males to study in the field of Society and Culture (e.g. Arts, Law), four times as likely to study in the field of Management and Commerce (e.g. Business, Tourism) and three times as likely to study in the field of Education. (Table 4)

Males were fourteen times more likely than females to enrol in Architecture and Building courses, thirteen times as likely to enrol in Engineering and Related Technologies courses, and twice as likely as females to enrol in Information Technology courses. (Table 4)

Females were more likely than males to be working in part-time jobs (46.7 per cent compared to 29.9 per cent), and more likely to be working in full-time jobs (33.6 per cent compared to 26.2 per cent). (Table 6)

Students of VET in schools

Almost four in ten Year 12 graduates in this region left school with a VET qualification (39.3 per cent), while 9.6 per cent were school-based apprentices or trainees (SATs). (Table 12 and Table 13)

Those with a VET qualification were less likely to enrol in a university degree course than others (16.8 per cent compared to 31.0 per cent). However, they had higher rates of transition to employment-based training (32.5 per cent compared to 19.1 per cent). (Table 12)

School-based apprentices and trainees were more likely to undertake apprenticeships and traineeships after school than other Year 12 completers (57.1 per cent compared to 20.9 per cent). (Table 13)

OP-eligible Students

Over four in ten (41.4 per cent) OP-eligible Year 12 completers commenced a university degree. Year 12 completers who were not OP-eligible were twice as likely to transition to VET programs (44.4 per cent) than OP-eligible students (22.2 per cent). (Table 14)

Certificate of Post-Compulsory School Education

There were insufficient numbers of Year 12 completers awarded a CPCSE in this region to show a meaningful comparison with other Year 12 completers. (Table 15)

Senior Certificate

There were insufficient numbers of Year 12 completers who were not awarded a Senior Certificate in this region to show a meaningful comparison with other Year 12 completers. (Table 16)

Indigenous

Indigenous Year 12 completers were less likely than their non-Indigenous peers to enrol at university (17.9 per cent compared to 25.5 per cent). Five Indigenous young people who completed the survey commenced university studies in 2008. (Table 17)

Language background other than English

There were insufficient numbers of Year 12 completers identified as Language background other than English (LBOTE) in this region to show a meaningful comparison with other Year 12 completers. (Table 18)

Socioeconomic status

Transition to post-school education and training was associated with socioeconomic status (SES), increasing from 48.4 per cent for the lowest SES quartile to 66.3 per cent for the highest SES quartile. (Table 19)

Regional Comparisons

Year 12 completers in Fitzroy/Central West had similar post-schooling destinations to other non-metropolitan Year 12 completers. (Figure 2)

Year 12 completers in Fitzroy/Central West were less likely to enter university or campus-based VET programs than Year 12 completers in Queensland, but more likely to enter apprenticeships and traineeships. (Figure 2)

Year 12 completers not in education or training in Fitzroy/Central West had similar employment destinations to non-metropolitan Year 12 completers generally, and to Year 12 completers statewide, although they were less likely to be working part-time and more likely to be working full-time. (Figure 5)

The occupational groups of Year 12 completers in Fitzroy/Central West resemble those of Year 12 completers statewide, although there were fewer Sales Assistants and Food Handlers, and more Clerks, Receptionists & Secretaries than statewide. (Table 7)

The industry categories of Year 12 completers in Fitzroy/Central West resemble those of Year 12 completers statewide, although there was less concentration in the

Retail and Hospitality industries, and more concentration in Mining, Manufacturing, and Electricity, Gas, Water & Waste Services than statewide. (Table 8)

The main reasons given for not studying by Fitzroy/Central West Year 12 completers resemble those of non-metropolitan and statewide respondents. (Table 10)

The main reasons given for not seeking work by Fitzroy/Central West Year 12 completers not in the labour market generally resemble those of non-metropolitan and statewide respondents, although caution should be used when interpreting this data due to the low numbers involved. (Table 11)

Comparisons between the destinations of Year 12 graduates from Fitzroy/Central West for the years 2005–08 reveal a broadly similar pattern, although there has been an increase in those working full-time. (Figure 4)

Main destinations

All respondents were categorised into their main destination, as outlined in Table 1. Tertiary students are assigned to the study categories regardless of their labour force status (i.e. they may also be working or even looking for work).

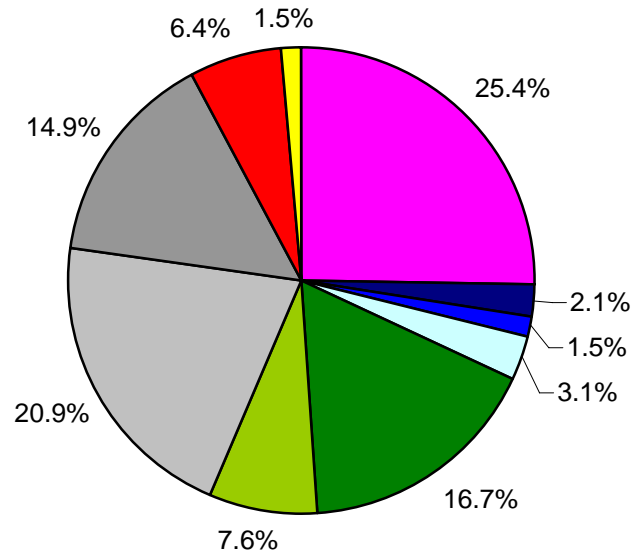

Figure 2 Main destinations of Year 12 completers, Fitzroy/Central West, Non-metropolitan and Queensland, 2008

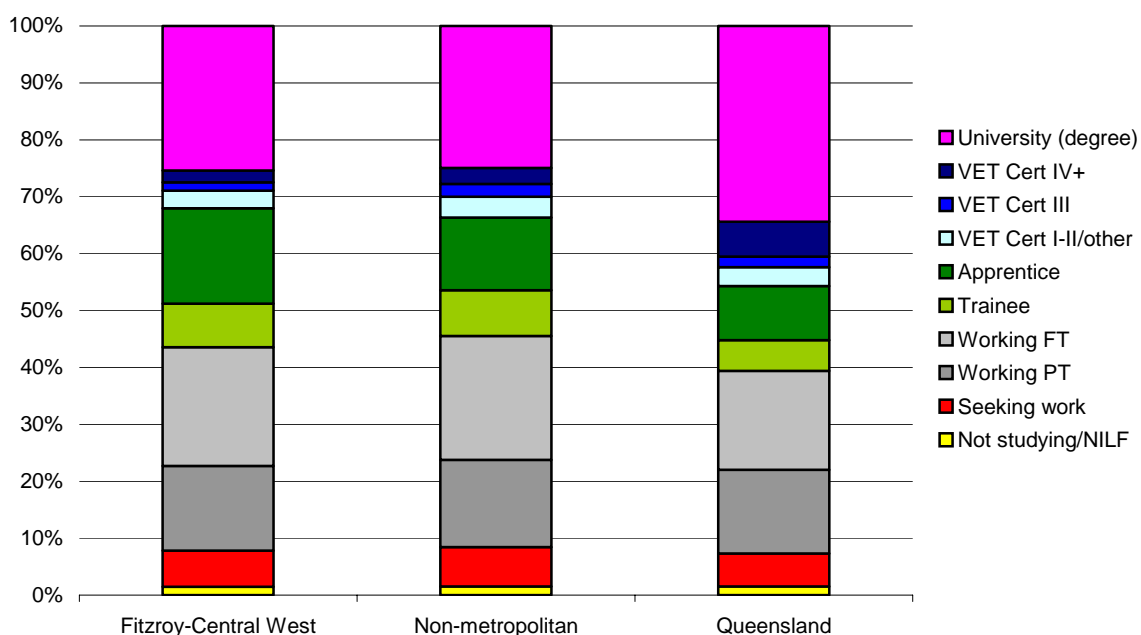
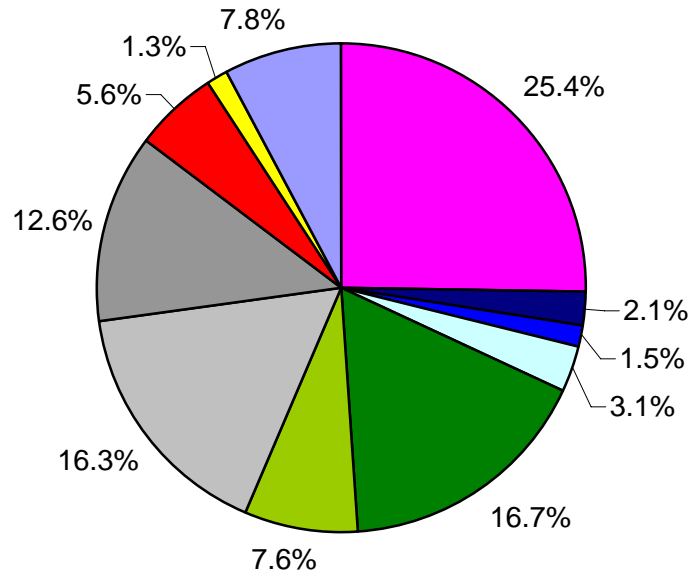

Figure 4 Comparison of main destinations of Year 12 completers, Fitzroy/Central West, 2005 - 2008

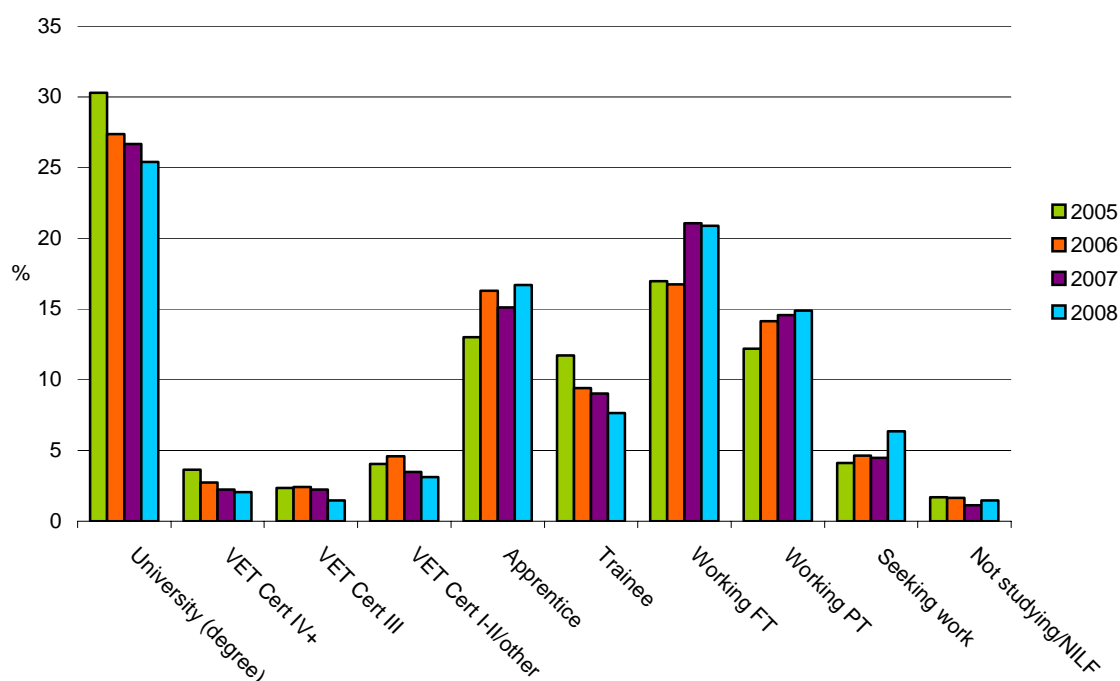

Figure 5 Main destinations of Year 12 completers not in education or training, Fitzroy/Central West, Non-metropolitan and Queensland, 2008

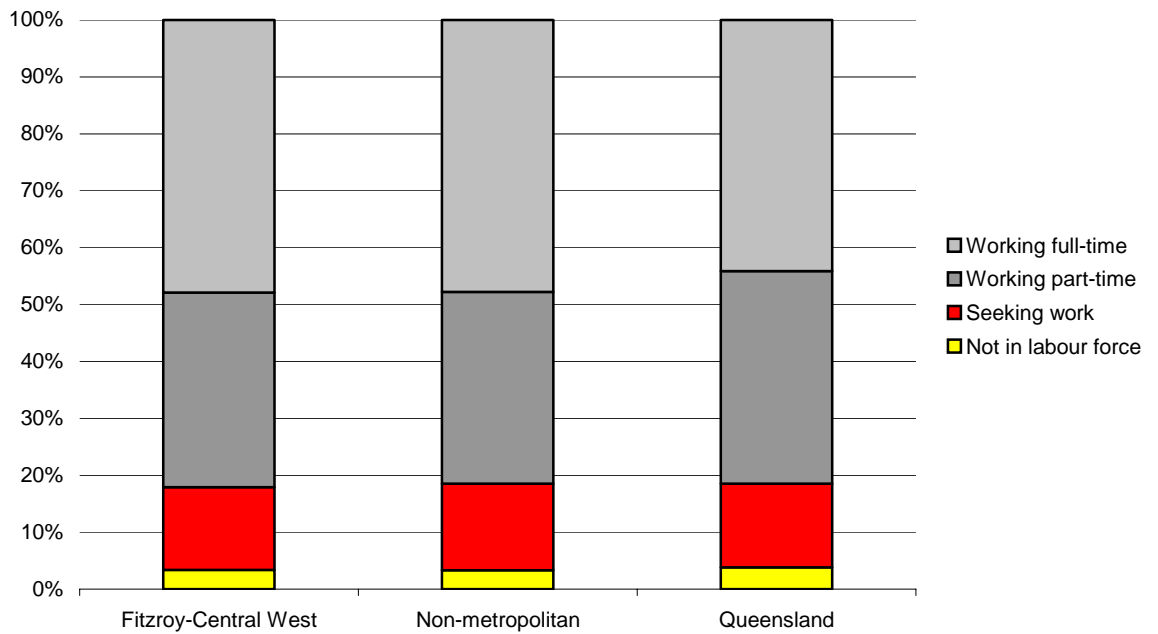

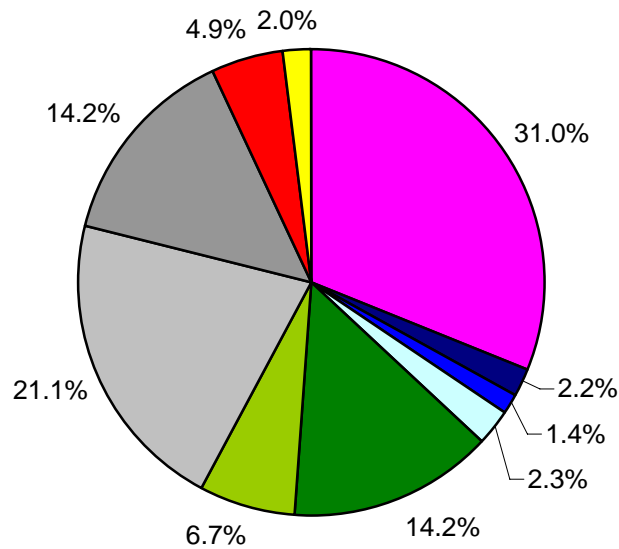

Figure 7 Main destinations of Year 12 completers, Rockhampton, Fitzroy/Central West, Non-metropolitan and Queensland, 2008

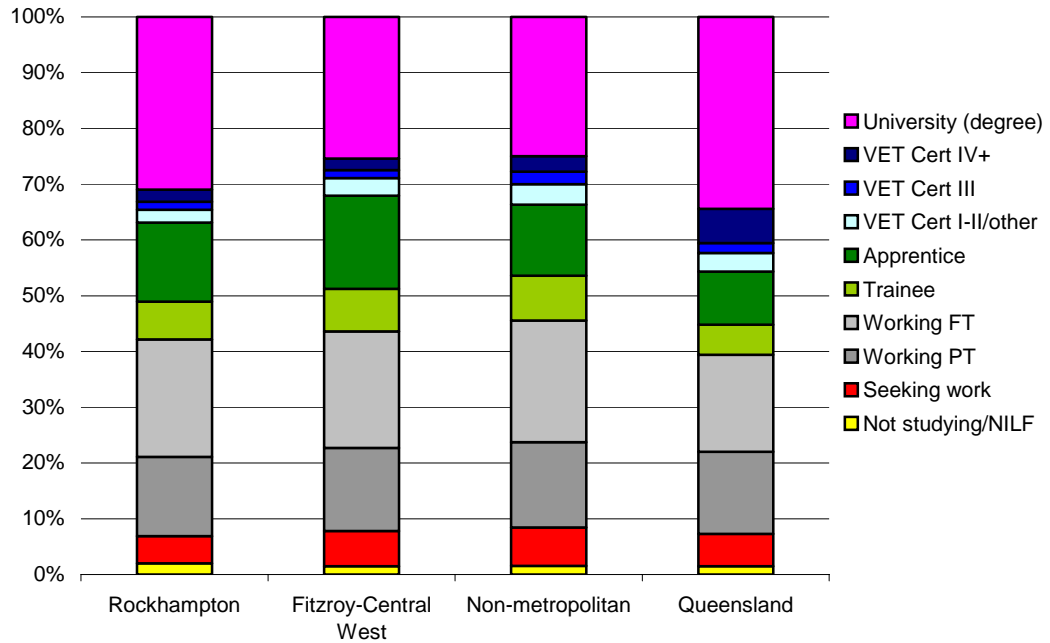
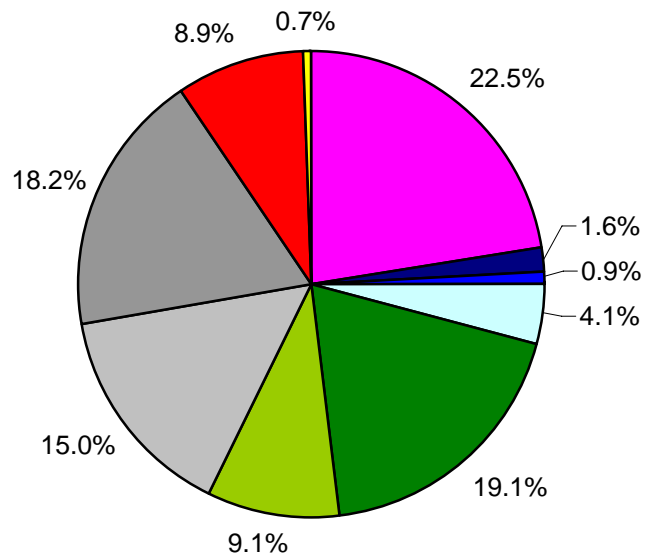

Figure 9 Main destinations of Year 12 completers, Gladstone, Fitzroy/Central West, Non-metropolitan and Queensland, 2008

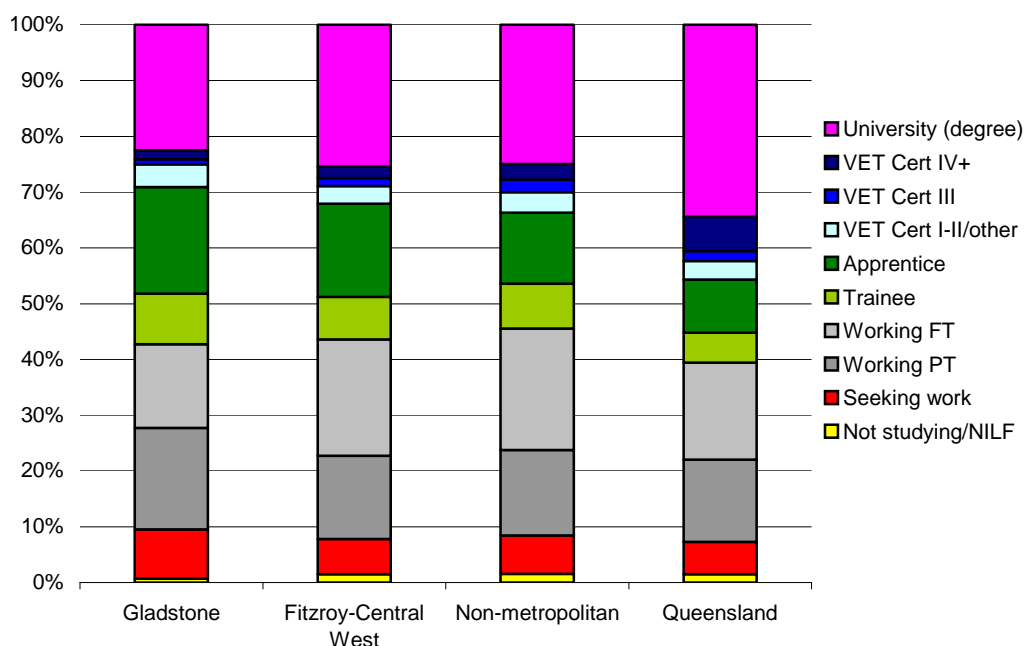

Figure 10 Main destinations of Year 12 completers, Fitzroy SD Bal, 2008

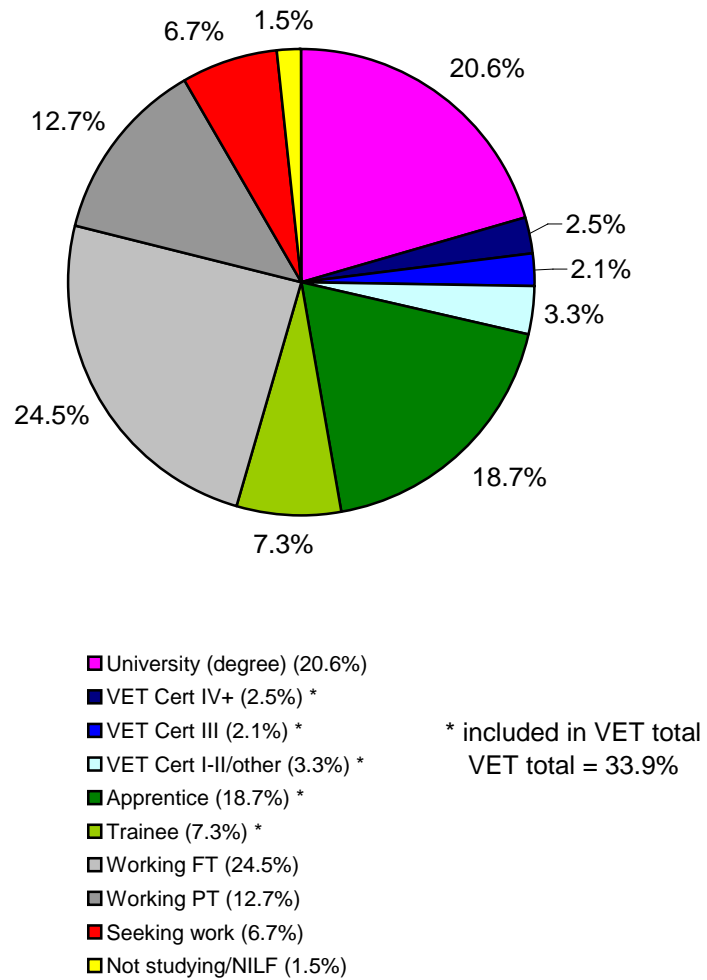

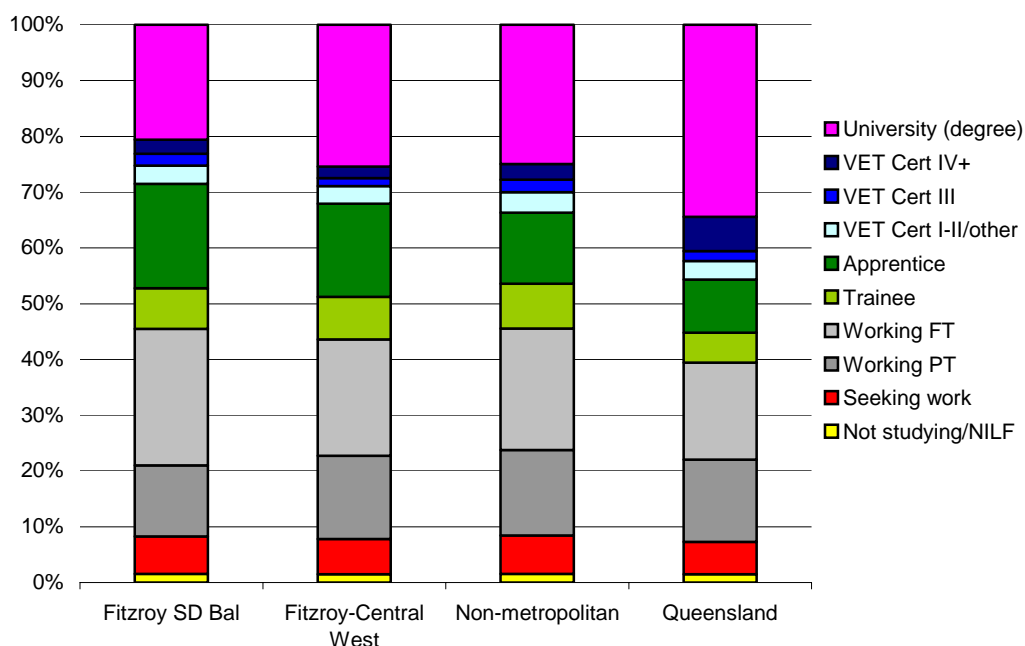

Figure 12 Main destinations of Year 12 completers, Central West, 2008

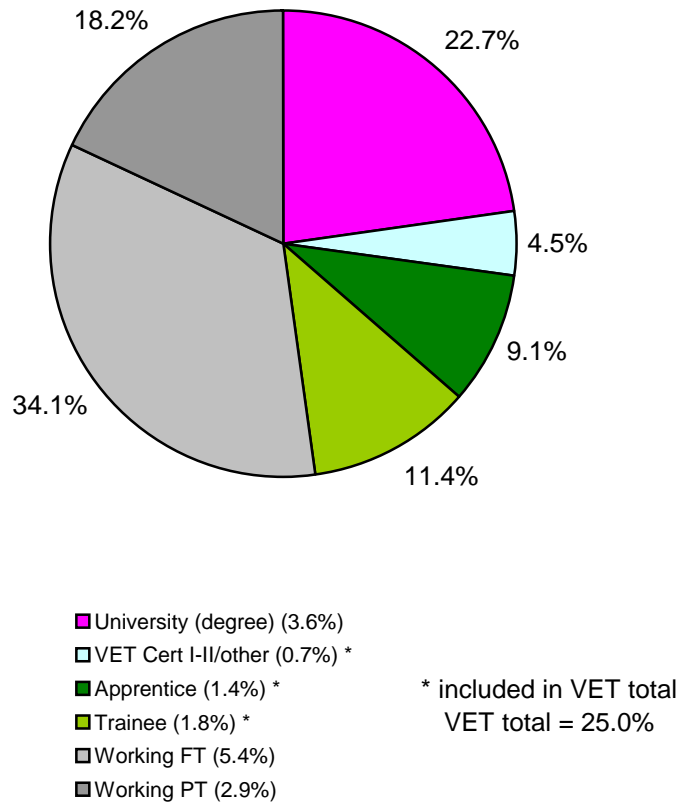

Figure 13 Main destinations of Year 12 completers, Central West, Fitzroy/Central West, Non-metropolitan and Queensland, 2008

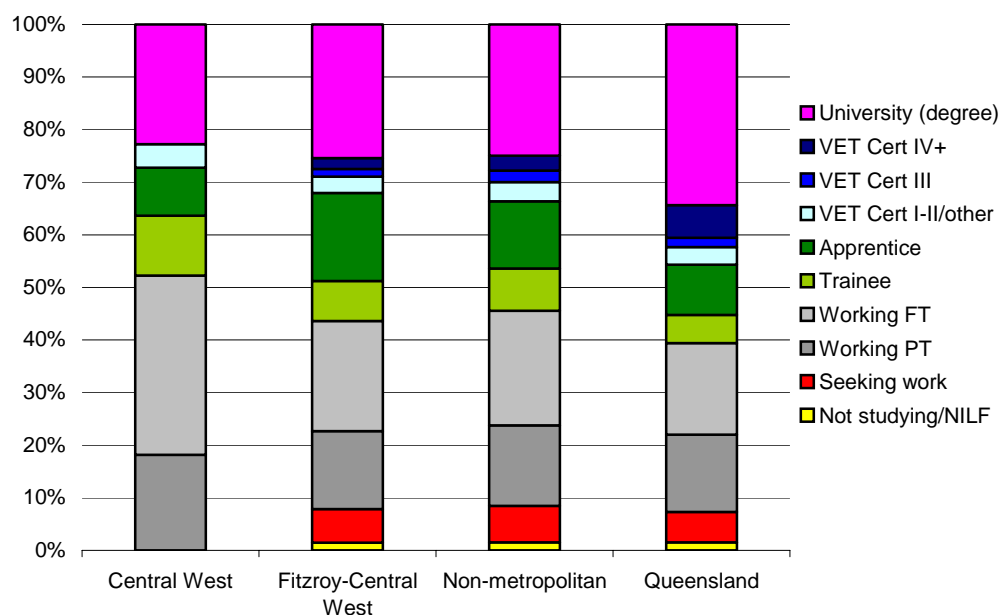

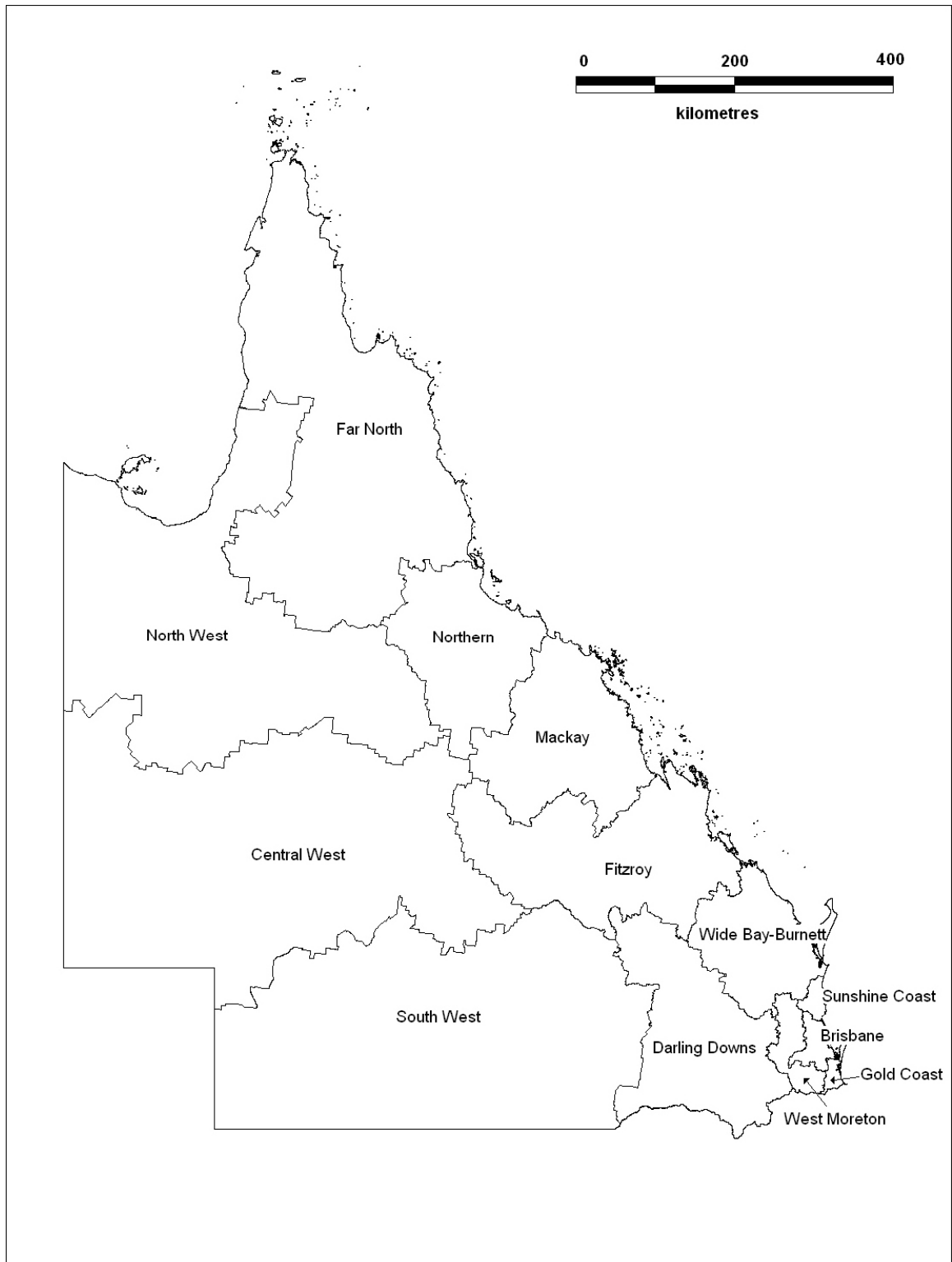


Figure A1B Brisbane, Gold Coast, Sunshine Coast and West Moreton Statistical Divisions, ABS, 2007
