Introduction

Aims of the project

The *Next Step* survey is an annual survey of every student who completed Year 12 in the previous year in Queensland, in Government and non-Government schools. The survey results show the initial study and work destinations of young people after completing school.

The objectives of the survey are to assist:

- parents and the wider public to know the achievements of students and to appreciate the range of options available to students
- schools to review and plan their services for students, especially in the senior years of schooling
- school systems to review their education policies as they affect the transition from school to further study and employment
- training bodies, universities, business and industry, local government and regional planners to plan their services.

The survey follows the destinations of students who completed Year 12 at Government schools, Catholic schools, independent schools and TAFE secondary colleges.

Methodology

The *Next Step* 2008 survey was conducted by the Department of Education, Training and the Arts through the Office of the Government Statistician (OGS), in accordance with the privacy provisions of the *Statistical Returns Act 1896*.

The survey targeted students who completed Year 12 in Queensland in 2007, including students at Government schools, non-Government schools and TAFE secondary colleges. All students who were awarded a Senior Certificate or Certificate of Post-Compulsory School Education (CPCSE) were included. The Senior Certificate is a formal record of achievement issued at the end of Year 12 to all students who complete at least one approved subject. The CPCSE is a separate certificate for students with an impairment or difficulties in learning that are not primarily due to socioeconomic, cultural and/or linguistic factors.

The targeted students were identified by means of a survey frame (or list) provided to the OGS by the Queensland Studies Authority (QSA). This list contained details for 41 889 Year 12 completers who were deemed in-scope for this survey.

The survey was conducted between 2 April and 17 May 2008, approximately six months after the young people left school. This timing was designed to be after tertiary education places for 2008 were accepted, and while most of these young people were still contactable via their 2007 home address details.

Responses were predominantly collected via computer-assisted telephone interviewing (CATI) with paper-based surveys collected from a small number of students for whom telephone details were not available. The average time for a completed interview was less than four minutes.

Prior to the survey, all Year 12 completers were sent a letter from the Queensland Minister for Education and Training advising them of the survey. Those without

usable telephone details but with a usable Australian or international address were sent a printed copy of the questionnaire and a reply paid envelope.

Completed paper-based questionnaires were returned directly to OGS for processing and data entry. All responding Year 12 graduates went into a draw for a chance to win one of several prizes offered as an incentive to encourage survey participation.

At the close of the survey, nearly all non-responding students for whom telephone numbers were available had received at least six attempts of contact. Non-responding students without telephone numbers were mailed two copies of the questionnaire. A total of 33 568 completed surveys were received. Of these, 306 were completed by paper-based questionnaire and 33 262 by CATI.

Regional reports are based on statistical divisions used by the Australian Bureau of Statistics.

The response rate for this region – Gold Coast – was 78.2 per cent.

Please note that some survey participants did not provide information for particular survey questions. As a result, the number of responses shown in some tables may not reflect the totals reported for the main destinations appearing in Table 2.

Students were allocated to this region on the basis of the location of the school they attended in 2007. A list of schools from this region is shown in the Appendix (Table A1A).

Main Findings – Gold Coast

Destinations

More than nine in ten (93.1 per cent) Year 12 completers in this region were studying or in paid employment at the time of the survey. (Figure 1)

Over six in ten (61.6 per cent) continued in some recognised form of education and training in the year after they left school. (Figure 1)

More than a third were undertaking a university degree (36.2 per cent). (Figure 1)

More than a quarter (25.4 per cent) were studying vocational education and training (VET). (Figure 1)

Almost two thirds of the campus-based VET students were studying at Certificate IV level or higher (8.2 per cent of Year 12 completers overall). (Figure 1)

More than one in eight (12.7 per cent) were undertaking employment-based training, either as an apprentice (8.6 per cent) or trainee (4.1 per cent). (Figure 1)

In addition to the above study destinations, a further 7.4 per cent of respondents from this region deferred a tertiary offer in 2008 (deferrers are shown in Figure 1 in their actual current destination and in Figure 3 as deferrers).

Over one-third (38.4 per cent) did not enter post-school education or training and were either employed (31.5 per cent), looking for work (4.9 per cent) or neither working, seeking work nor studying (2.0 per cent). (Figure 1)

Learning: education and training destinations

Amongst the 61.6 per cent of Year 12 completers continuing in some form of education or training the most common fields of study were Management and Commerce (e.g. Business, Tourism), Health, Engineering and Related Technologies, Creative Arts and Society and Culture. (Table 4)

Griffith University and Gold Coast Institute of TAFE were the two tertiary institutions most commonly entered by Year 12 completers, accounting for over one-half of Year 12 completers (56.1 per cent) in post-school education and training destinations. (Table 5)

Earning: employment destinations

Of those young people working, almost two-thirds were in part-time employment (62.8 per cent), while 21.0 per cent were in full-time employment, 11.0 per cent were apprentices and 5.2 per cent were trainees. (Table 6)

Over one-half of all Year 12 completers in employment (59.1 per cent) were working in just three occupational groups — Sales Assistants, Food Handlers and Clerks, Receptionists & Secretaries. Sales Assistants was the most common occupational group (35.3 per cent), with the next most common being Food Handlers (14.3 per cent) followed by Clerks, Receptionists & Secretaries (9.5 per cent). (Table 7)

Not learning or earning

The survey identified 4.9 per cent of Year 12 graduates who were seeking work. (Figure 1)

Approximately one in every fifty Year 12 graduates were neither studying nor seeking work (2.0 per cent). This group includes those with a disability or health condition, and those travelling or waiting for their course to commence. (Figure 1)

The most common reasons given for not continuing in study were that young people wanted a break from study (for example to travel), or were undecided and considering options. (Table 9)

Different people, different pathways

The survey found different patterns for different groups of young people.

Sex

There were differences in the destinations of males and females. In particular:

Females were more likely than males to enter a university degree course (40.8 per cent compared to 31.3 per cent of males), and were just as likely to enrol in campus-based (i.e. not apprenticeships or traineeships) VET programs (13.1 per cent compared to 12.3 per cent of males). (Table 2)

Females were more than twice as likely to enter university as VET programs (40.8 per cent for university compared to 20.1 per cent for VET), while the rates for males were similar (31.3 per cent for university compared to 31.1 per cent for VET). (Table 2)

Males were almost eight times more likely than females to enter an apprenticeship, while females were more likely than males to commence a traineeship. (Table 2)

Females were more than five times as likely as males to study in the field of Education and twice as likely to study in the fields of Food, Hospitality and Personal Services, and Health. (Table 4)

Males were sixteen times more likely than females to enrol in Architecture and Building, ten times as likely to enrol in Engineering and Related Technologies, and seven times as likely to enrol in Information Technology courses. (Table 4)

Females were more likely than males to be working in part-time jobs (71.9 per cent compared to 52.5 per cent), while males were more likely than females to be working in full-time jobs (23.0 per cent compared to 19.2 per cent). (Table 6)

Students of VET in schools

Almost half the Year 12 graduates in this region left school with a VET qualification (45.7 per cent), while 11.7 per cent were school-based apprentices or trainees (SATs). (Table 12 and Table 13)

Those with a VET qualification were less likely to enrol in a university degree course than others (20.3 per cent compared to 49.7 per cent). However, they had higher rates of transition to employment-based training (17.7 per cent compared to 8.5 per cent). They were also more likely to enter employment with no further education or training (39.4 per cent compared to 24.8 per cent). (Table 12)

School-based apprentices and trainees were almost three times as likely to undertake apprenticeships and traineeships after school as other Year 12 completers (29.9 per cent compared to 10.4 per cent). (Table 13)

OP-eligible Students

Over one-half (57.9 per cent) of OP-eligible Year 12 completers had commenced a university degree. Year 12 completers who were not OP-eligible were almost three times more likely to transition to VET programs (40.1 per cent) than OP-eligible students (15.0 per cent). (Table 14)

Certificate of Post-Compulsory School Education

Year 12 completers who were awarded a Certificate of Post-Compulsory School Education (CPCSE) were just as likely to enrol in VET courses (29.2 per cent) as other Year 12 completers (25.4 per cent). In particular, they were almost seven times more likely to enrol in VET Certificate I-II/other (20.8 per cent compared to 3.1 per cent for students who did not complete a CPCSE). CPCSE graduates were also five times more likely to be either seeking work or not studying and not in the labour force. (Table 15)

Senior Certificate

More than one-third of students who were awarded a senior certificate had commenced a university degree (36.4 per cent). Year 12 completers who were awarded a senior certificate were almost three times as likely to be studying or in paid employment as other Year 12 graduates (93.4 per cent compared with 38.5 per cent). (Table 16)

Indigenous

Indigenous Year 12 completers were less likely than their non-Indigenous peers to enrol at university (24.0 per cent compared to 36.4 per cent). A total of twelve Indigenous young people who completed the survey commenced university studies in 2008. (Table 17)

Indigenous students were more likely to be an apprentice or trainee than non-Indigenous students (24.0 per cent compared to 12.6 per cent) and were less likely to have a main destination of working (26.0 per cent compared to 31.5 per cent). (Table 17)

Language background other than English

Language background other than English (LBOTE) students were more likely than other Year 12 graduates to enrol at university (53.8 per cent compared to 35.1 per cent) and were also more likely to enrol in campus-based VET courses (17.3 per cent compared to 12.4 per cent). (Table 15)

LBOTE students were less likely than other Year 12 graduates to be in employment-based training (5.8 per cent compared to 13.2 per cent). They were also less likely to enter employment without further education and training (18.5 per cent compared to 32.3 per cent). (Table 18)

Socioeconomic status

Transition to post-school education and training was associated with socioeconomic status (SES), increasing consistently from 53.0 per cent for the lowest SES quartile to 67.6 per cent for the highest SES quartile. (Table 16)

Regional Comparisons

Year 12 completers in the Gold Coast had similar post-schooling destinations to other metropolitan and Queensland Year 12 completers. (Figure 2)

Year 12 completers not in education or training in the Gold Coast had similar employment destinations to metropolitan Year 12 completers generally, and to Year 12 completers statewide. (Figure 5)

The occupations and industry categories of Year 12 completers in the Gold Coast closely resemble those of Year 12 completers statewide. (Table 7 and Table 8)

The main reasons given for not studying by Gold Coast Year 12 completers resemble those of metropolitan and statewide respondents. (Table 10)

The main reasons given for not seeking work by Gold Coast Year 12 completers not in the labour market resemble those of metropolitan and statewide respondents. (Table 11)

Comparisons between the destinations of Year 12 graduates from the Gold Coast for the years 2005–08 reveal broadly similar patterns. (Figure 4)

Main destinations

All respondents were categorised into their main destination, as outlined in Table 1. Tertiary students are assigned to the study categories regardless of their labour force status (i.e. they may also be working or even looking for work).

Figure 1 Main destinations of Year 12 completers, Gold Coast, 2008

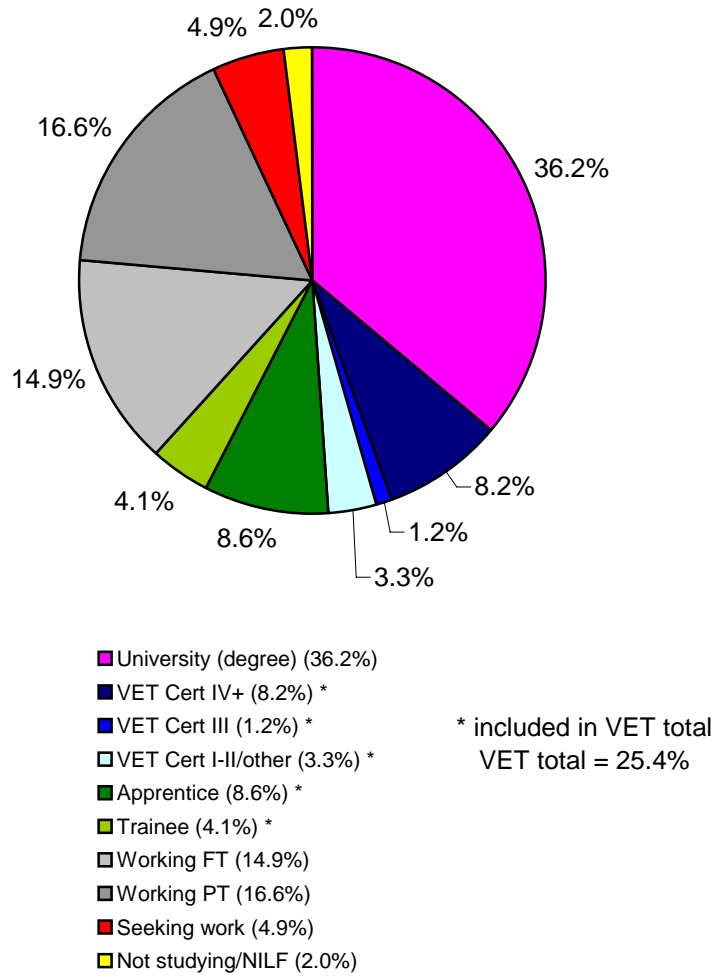

Figure 2 Main destinations of Year 12 completers, Gold Coast, Metropolitan and Queensland, 2008

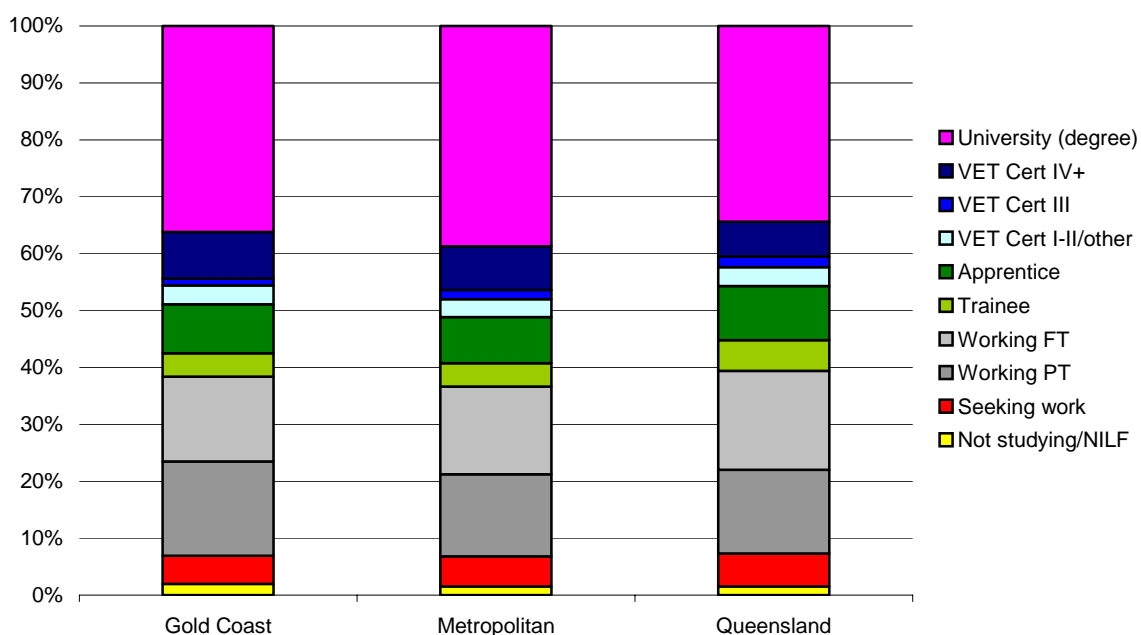
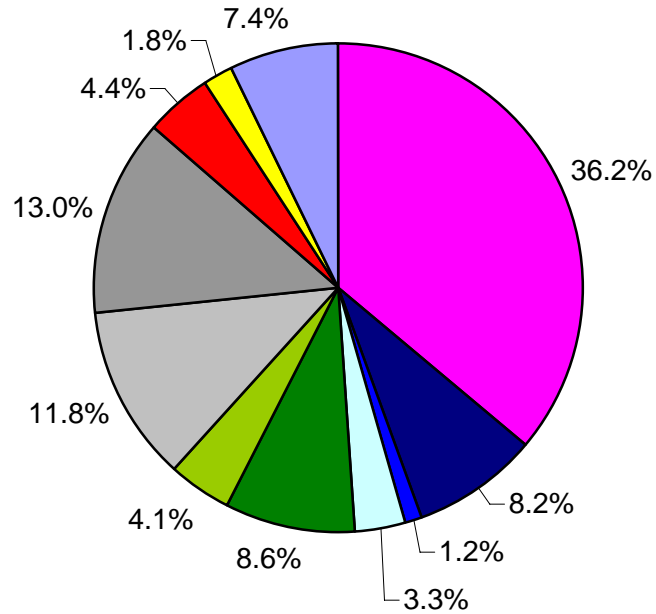

Figure 4 Comparison of main destinations of Year 12 completers, Gold Coast, 2005 - 2008

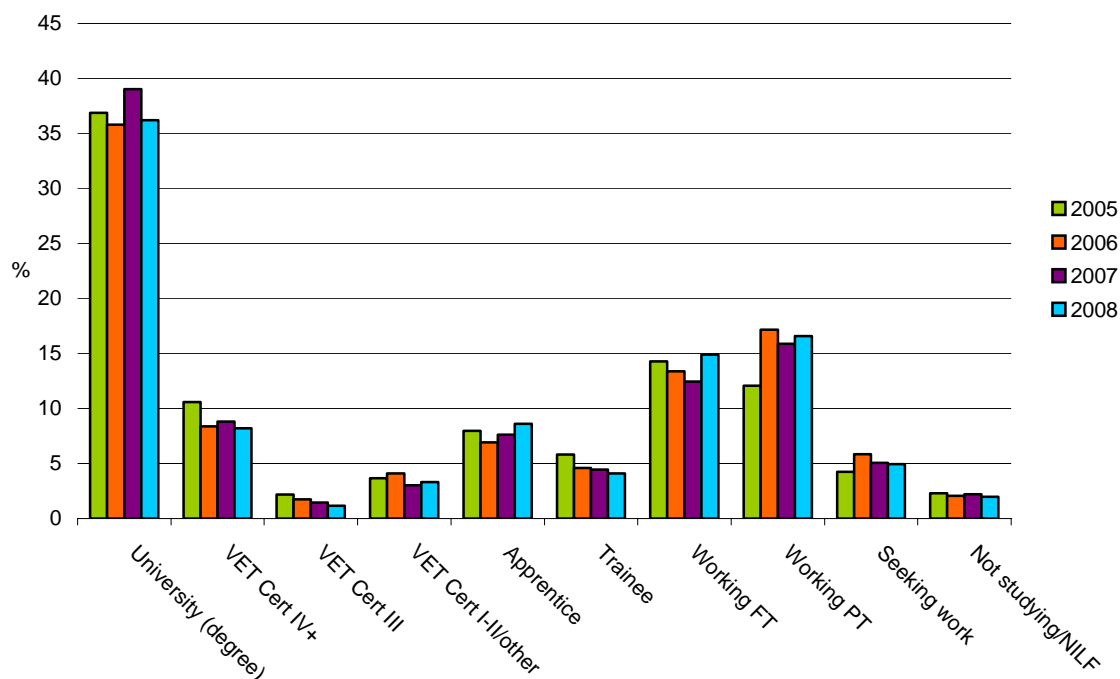

Figure 5 Main destinations of Year 12 completers not in education or training, Gold Coast, Metropolitan and Queensland, 2008

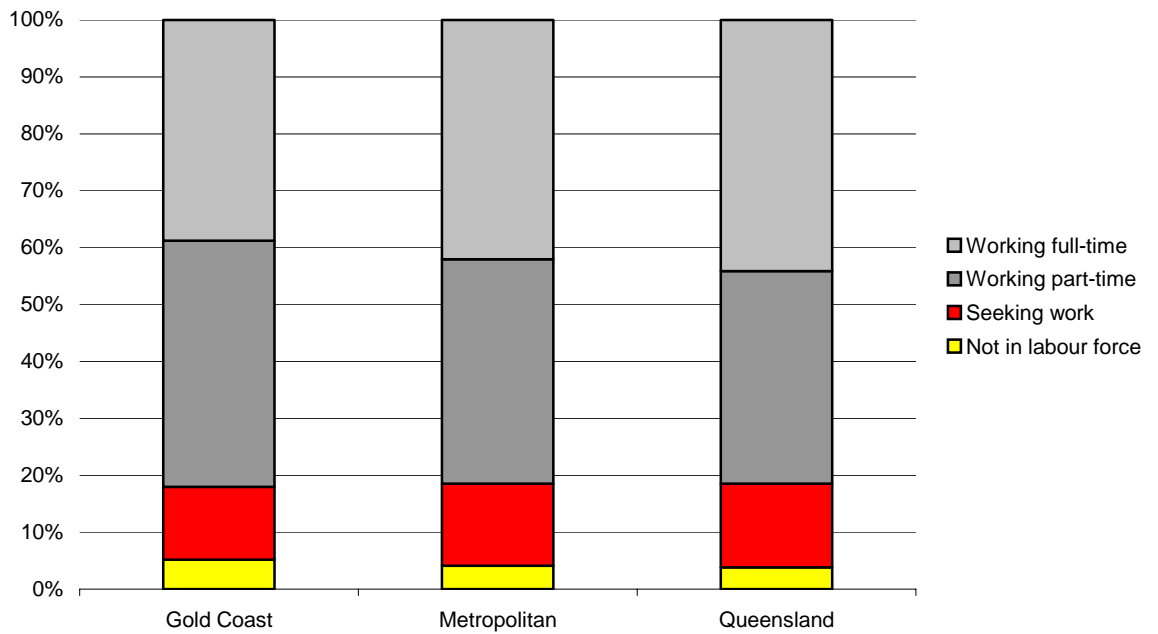

Figure 6 Main destinations of Year 12 completers, Gold Coast North, 2008

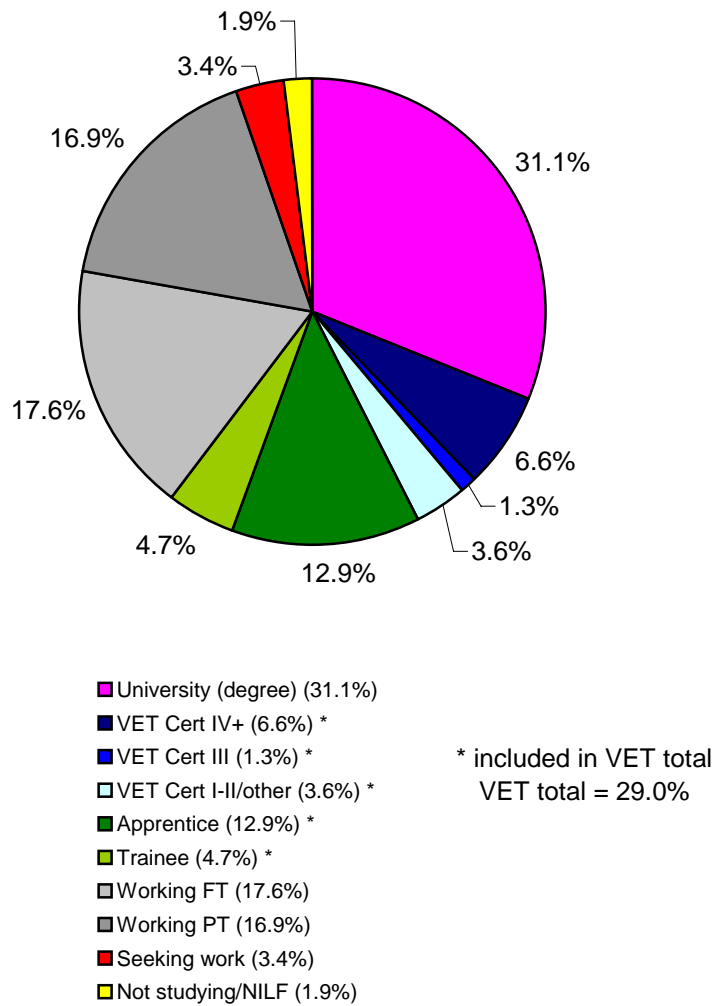

Figure 7 Main destinations of Year 12 completers, Gold Coast North, Gold Coast, Metropolitan and Queensland, 2008

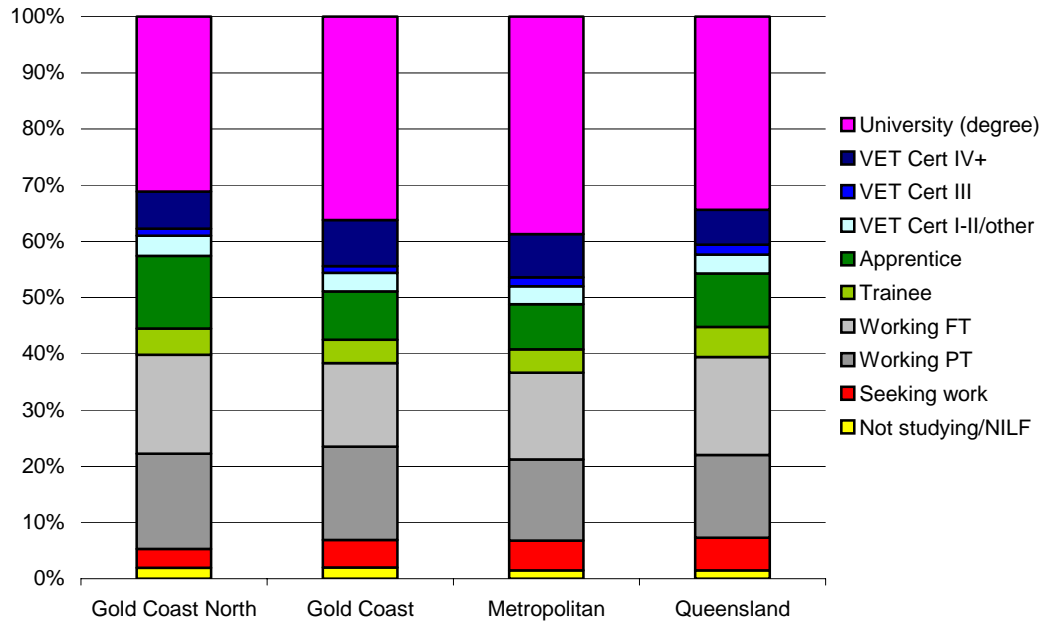

Figure 8 Main destinations of Year 12 completers, Gold Coast East, 2008

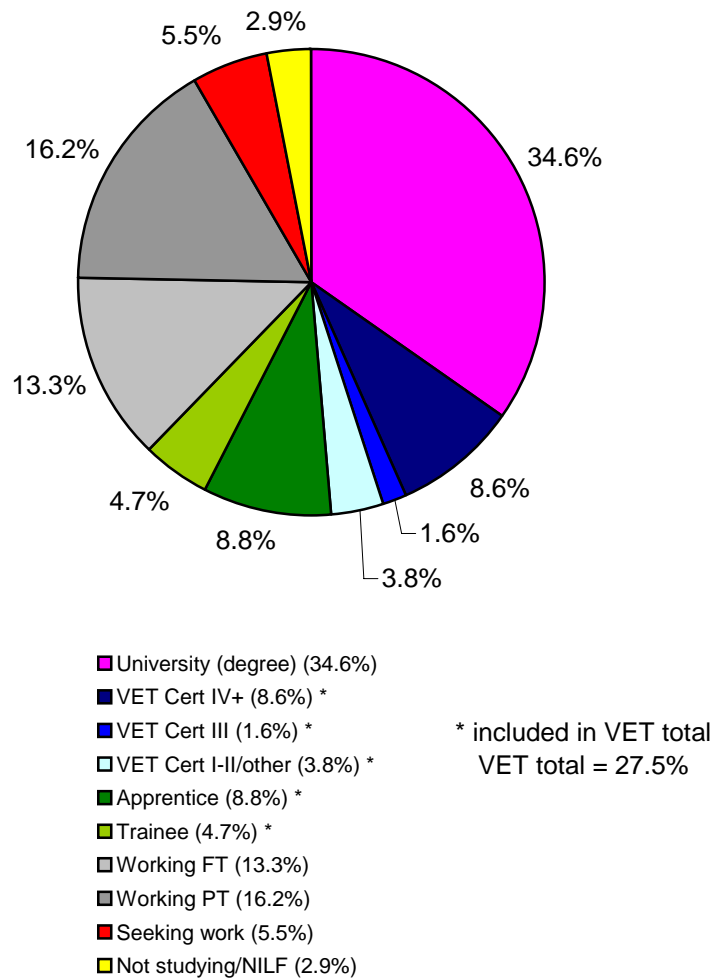

Figure 9 Main destinations of Year 12 completers, Gold Coast East, Gold Coast, Metropolitan and Queensland, 2008

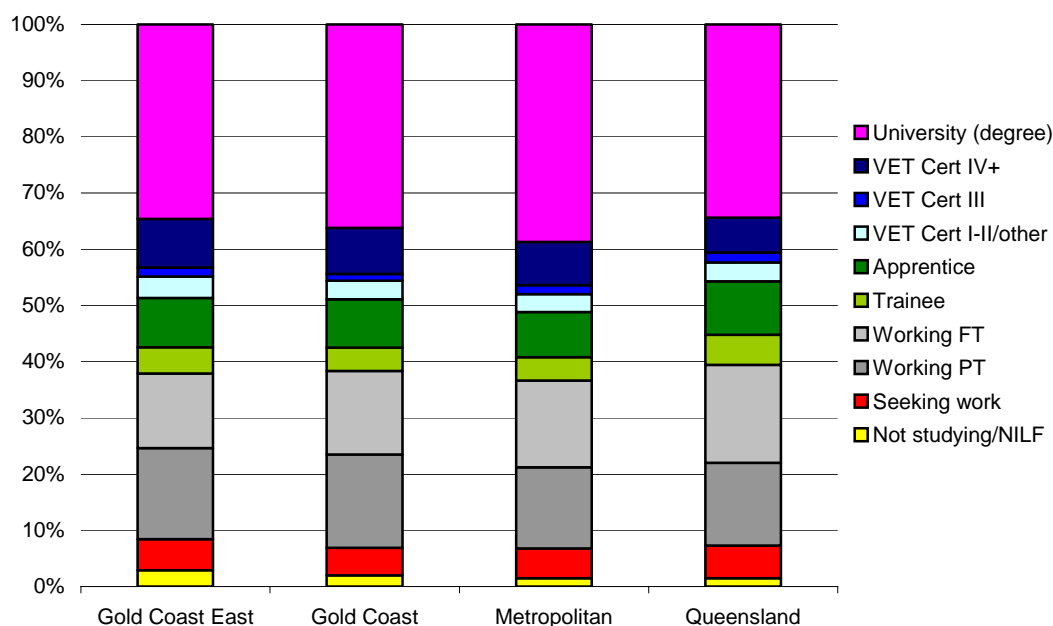

Figure 10 Main destinations of Year 12 completers, Gold Coast West/SD Bal, 2008

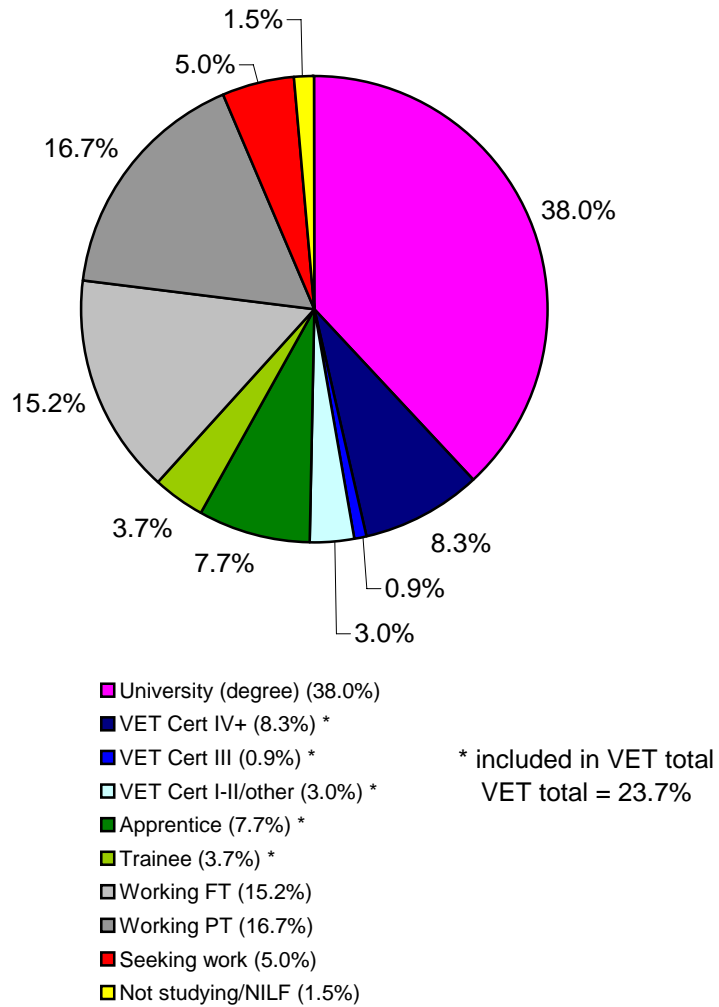

Figure 11 Main destinations of Year 12 completers, Gold Coast West/SD Bal, Gold Coast, Metropolitan and Queensland, 2008

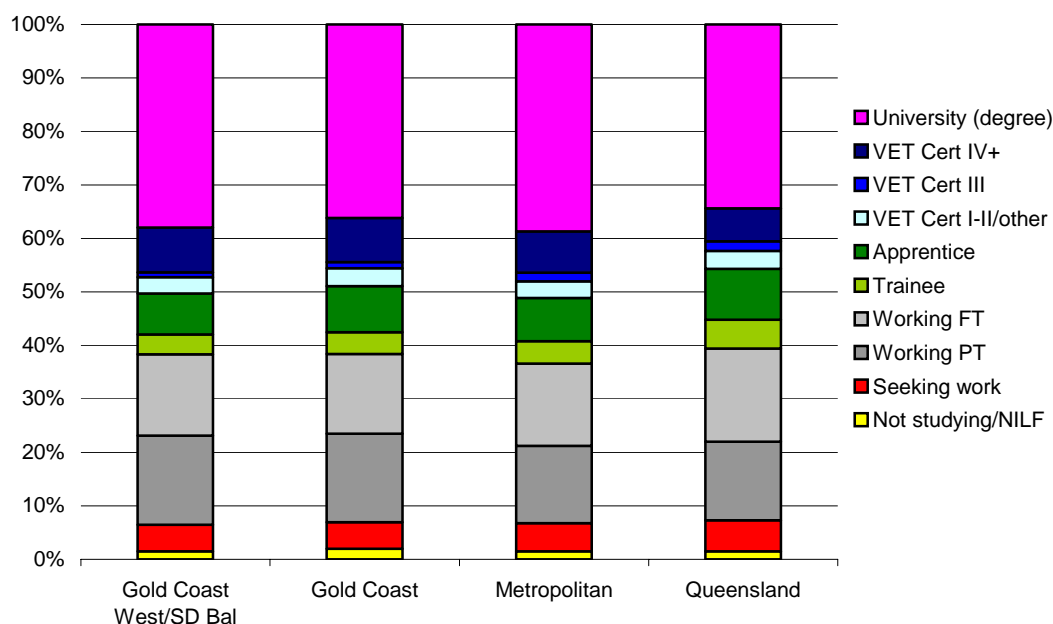

Figure A1A Queensland Statistical Divisions, ABS, 2007

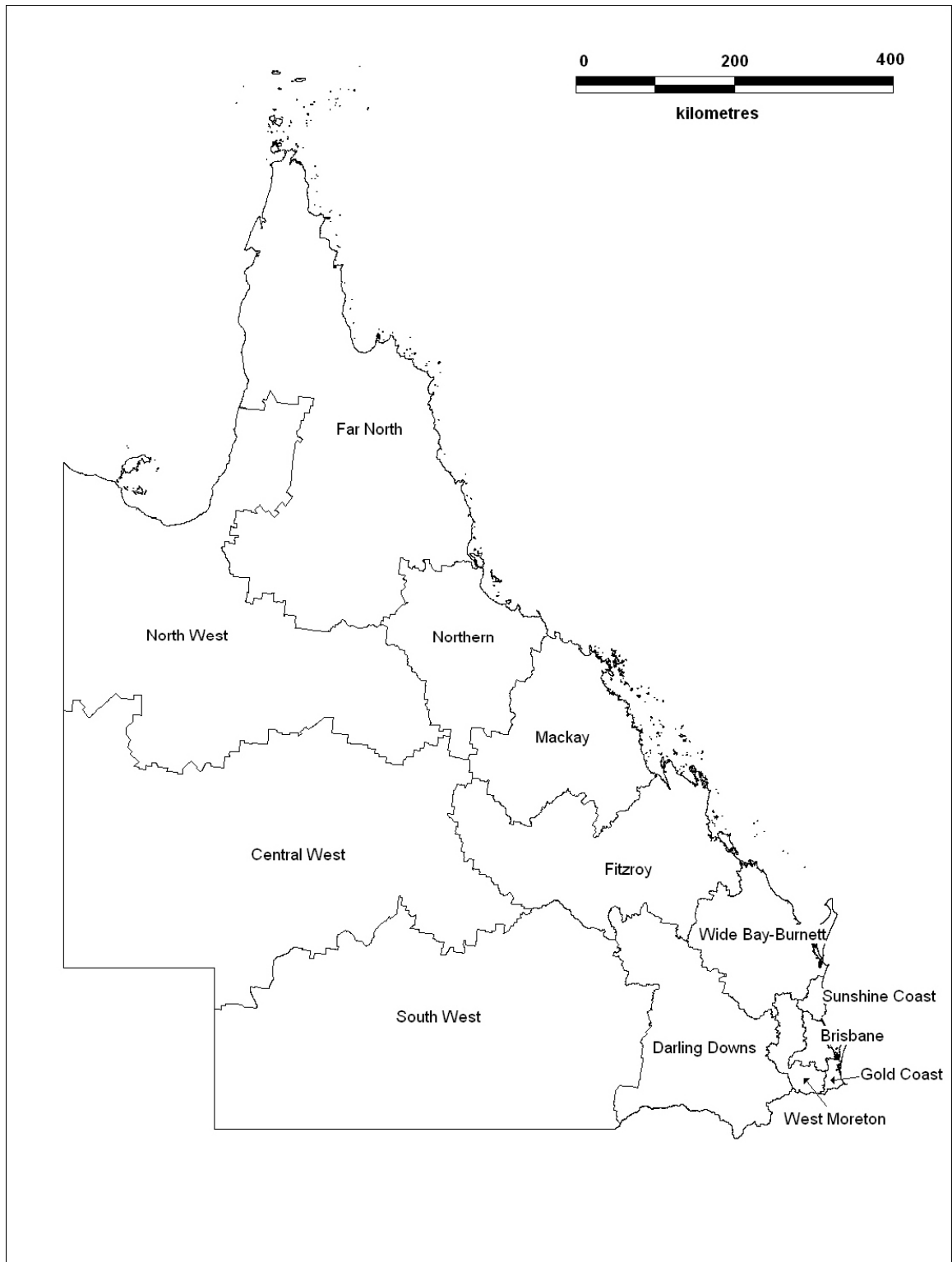


Figure A1B Brisbane, Gold Coast, Sunshine Coast and West Moreton Statistical Divisions, ABS, 2007
