# Purpose of survey

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To assist:

- Parents and the wider public to know the achievements of students and to appreciate the range of options available to students
- Schools to review and plan their services for students
- School systems to review their education policies as they affect the transition from school to further study and employment
- Training bodies, universities, business and industry, local government and regional planners to plan their services.

  - Print and available on the web
- Regional reports
  - Customised to eight regions
  - Available on the web
- School reports
  - Sent to individual schools
  - Assists in meeting schools reporting requirements

# Methodology

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- Targeted all students who completed Year 12 in 2005
  - Senior Certificate &/or CPCSE
- This amounted to more than 40,000 young people from over 400 schools across Queensland
- 30 989 respondents
- Predominantly telephone survey with some paper-based collection
- Conducted between March and May approximately 6 months after leaving school

# Survey Management

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- Managed by the Department of Education & The Arts
- The survey was conducted by Office of Government Statistician
- Reference Group comprised representatives of school sectors, principals' associations, QSA, DET, OGS and the University of Melbourne
- Data analysed by the Centre of Post Compulsory Education and Life-long Learning at the University of Melbourne.

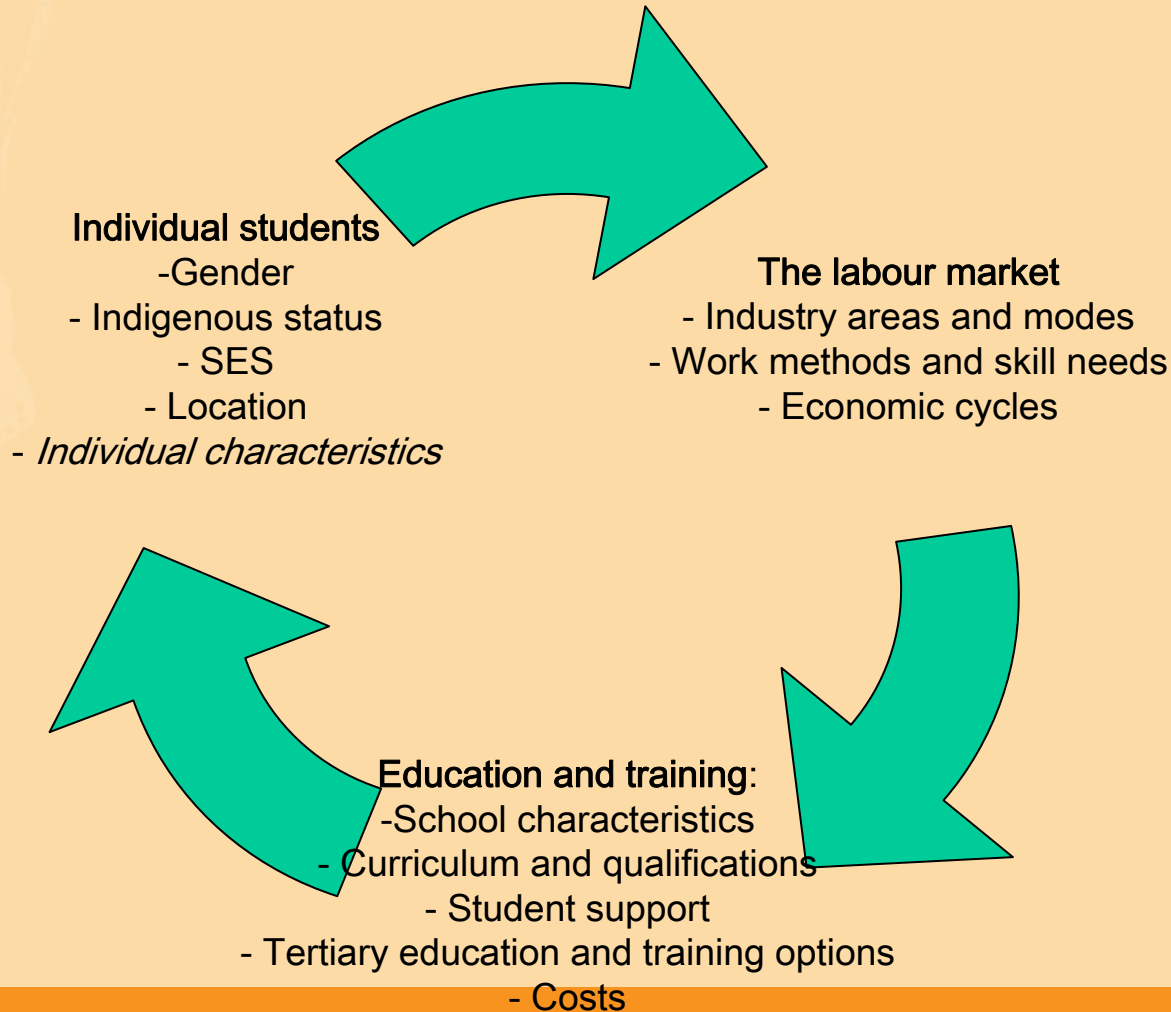

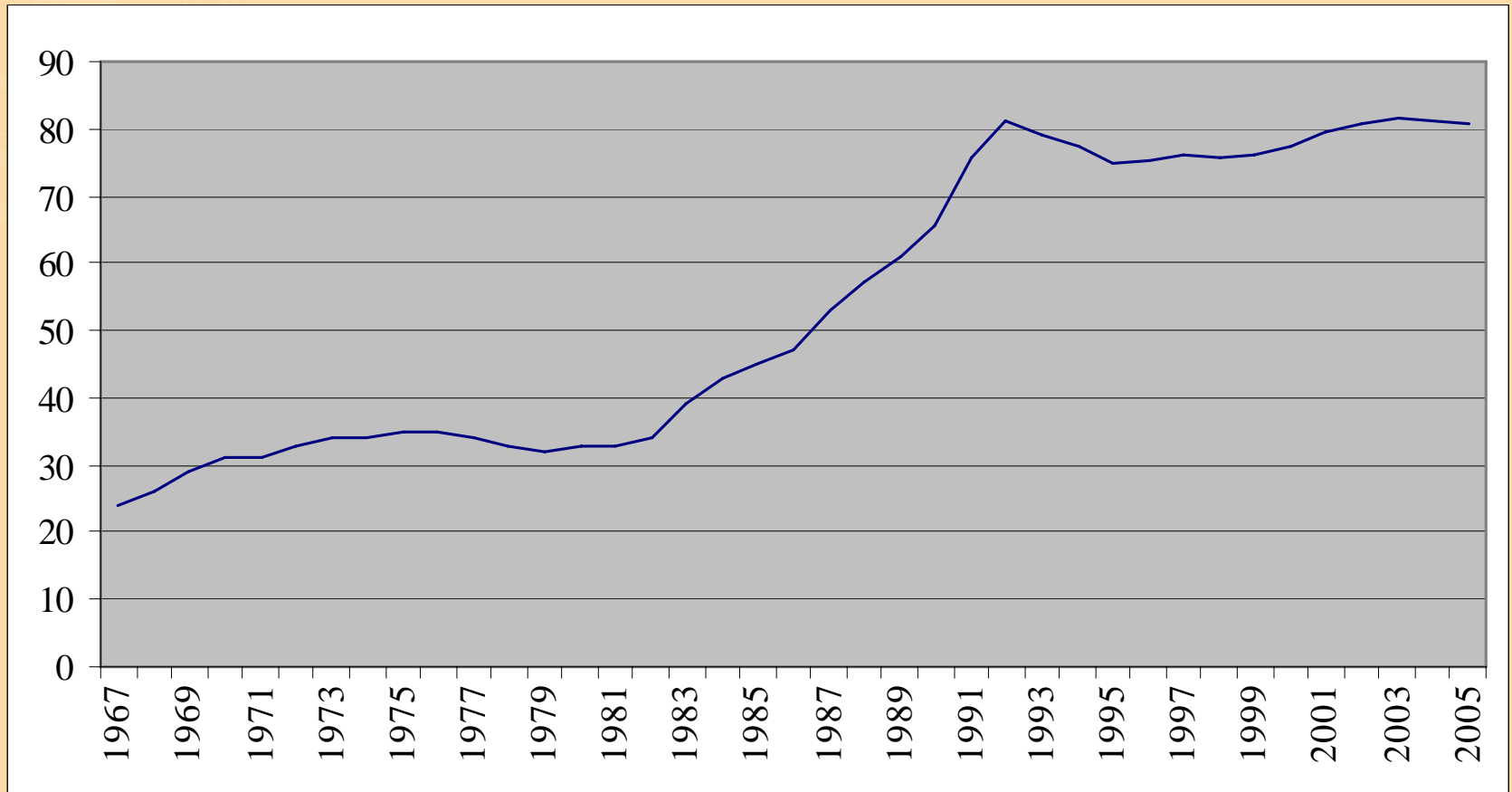


## Transition as the interactions between

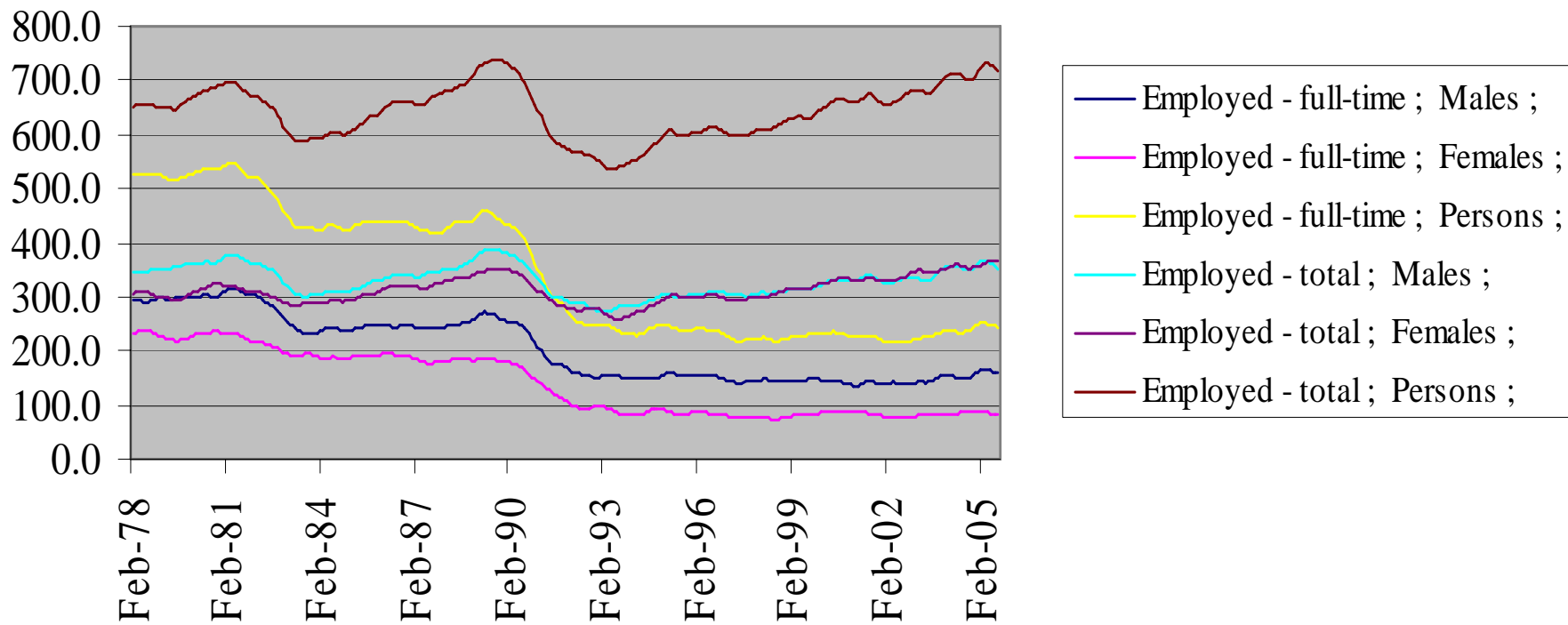




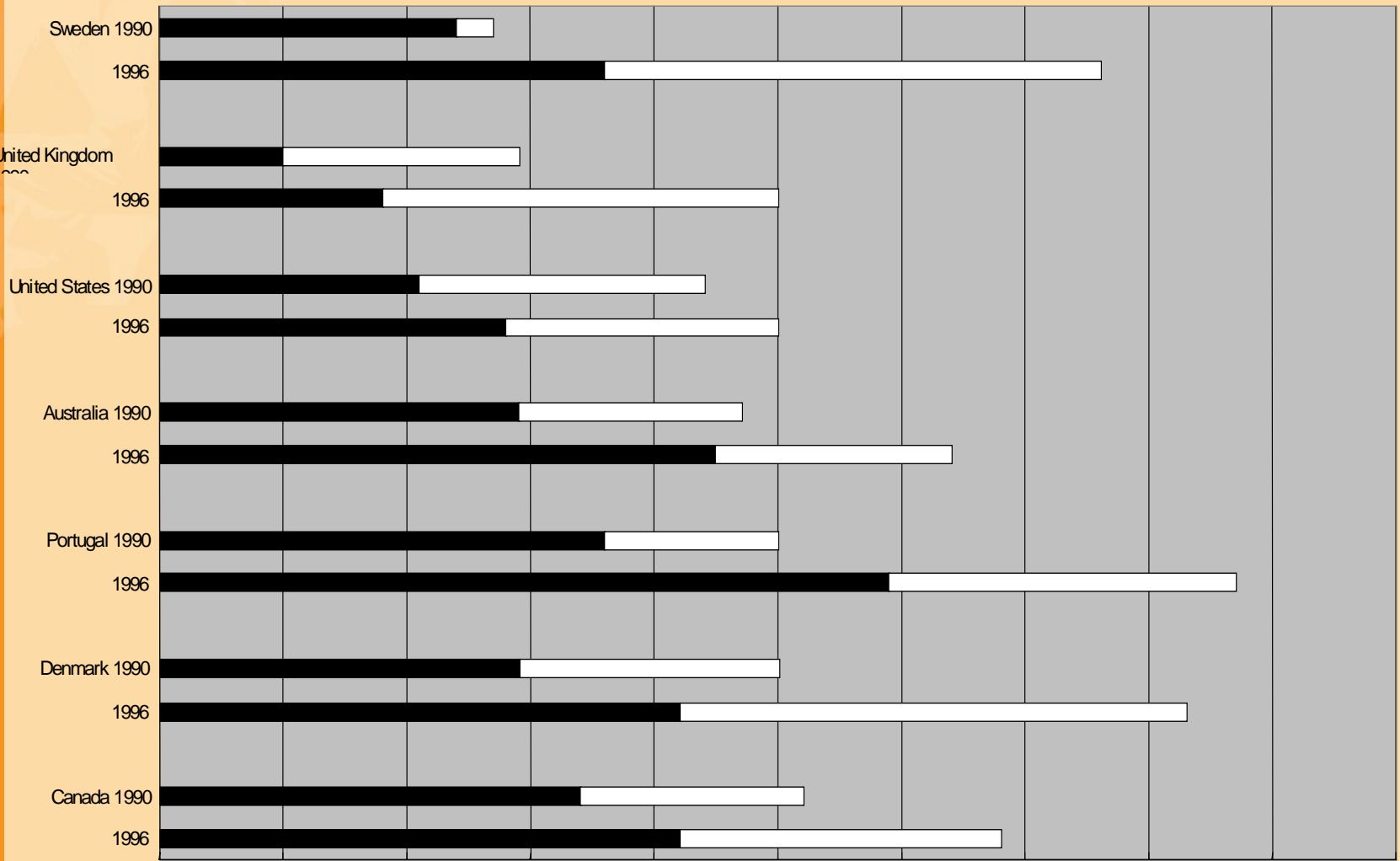
# Year 12 retention

Total duration of the transition in years

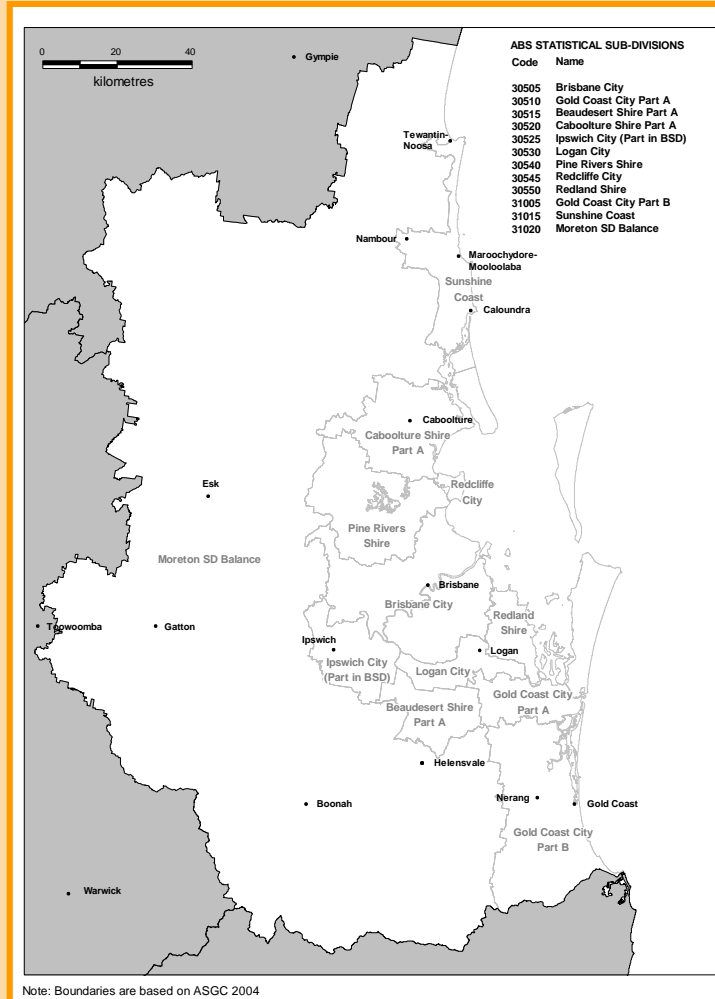

## Definitions of Main Destinations

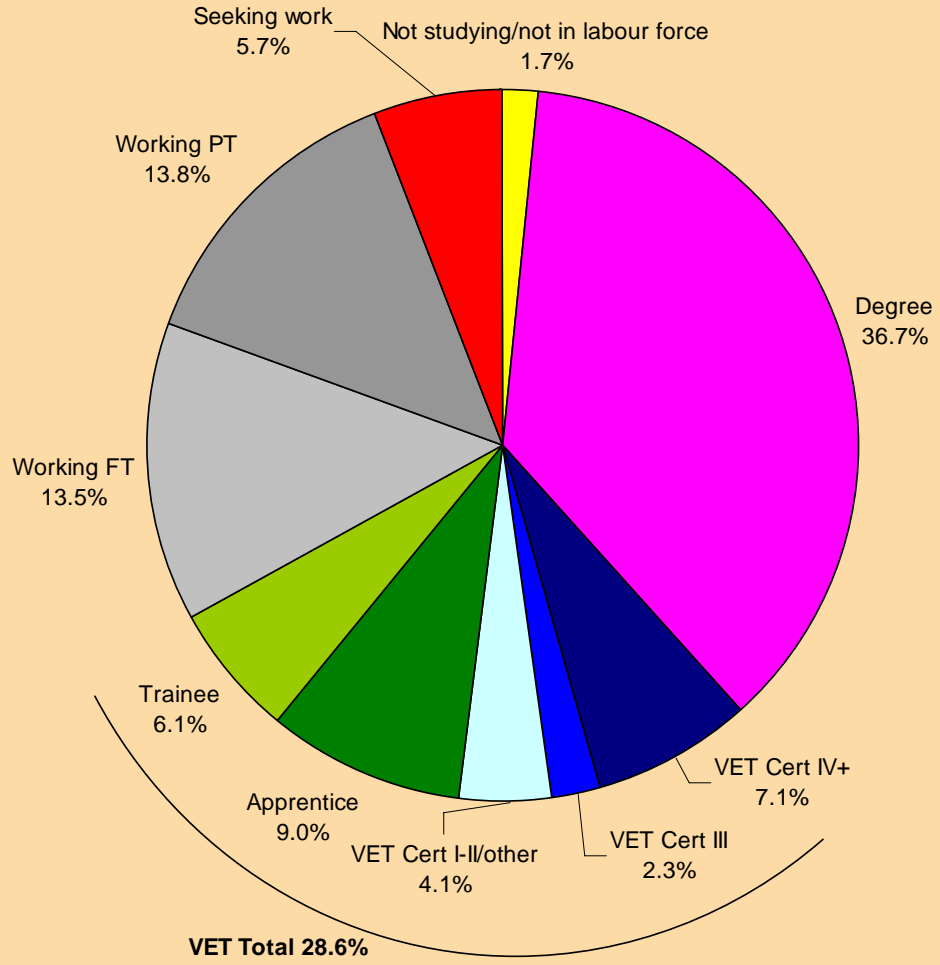
<i>Higher Education</i>	
University (degree)	Studying at degree level*
<i>VET categories</i>	
VET Cert IV+*	Studying Certificate IV, Diploma or Advanced Diploma (excluding apprentices and trainees).
VET Cert III*	Studying Certificate III (excluding apprentices and trainees)
VET Cert I-II/other*	Studying Certificate I or II (excluding apprentices and trainees). Also includes respondents in "unspecified" VET certificate, other basic courses or with unknown course level.
Apprentice	Working and in employment-based apprenticeship
Trainee	Working and in employment-based traineeship
<i>No further education or training</i>	
Working full-time	Working full-time (35 hours or more) and not in a study or training destination. This includes people with part-time or casual jobs that total 35 hours or more.
Working part-time	Working part-time or casual (fewer than 35 hours) and not in a study or training destination.
Seeking work	Looking for work and not in a study or training destination.
Not studying and not in the labour force	Not in study or training, not working and not looking for work.

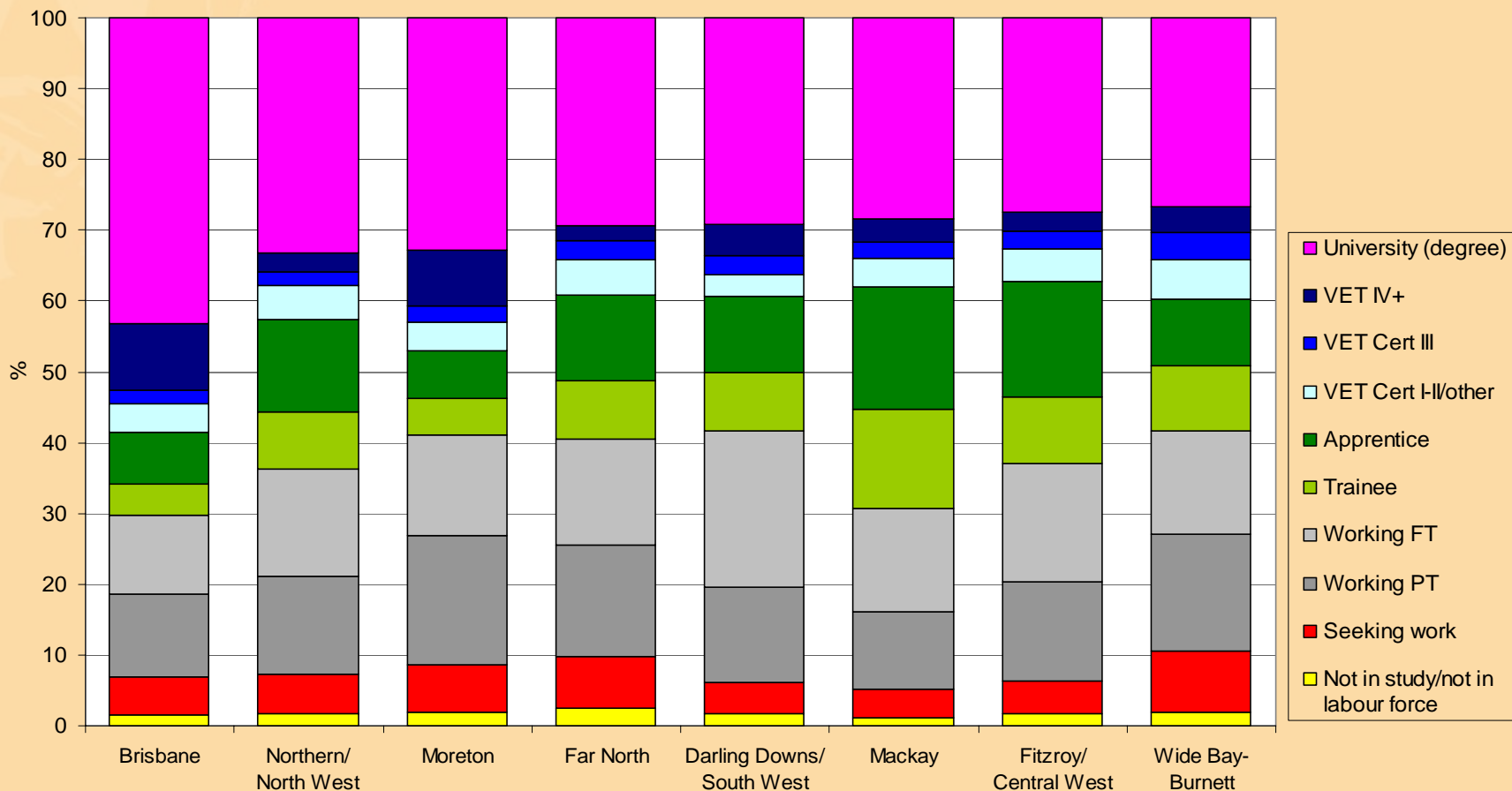

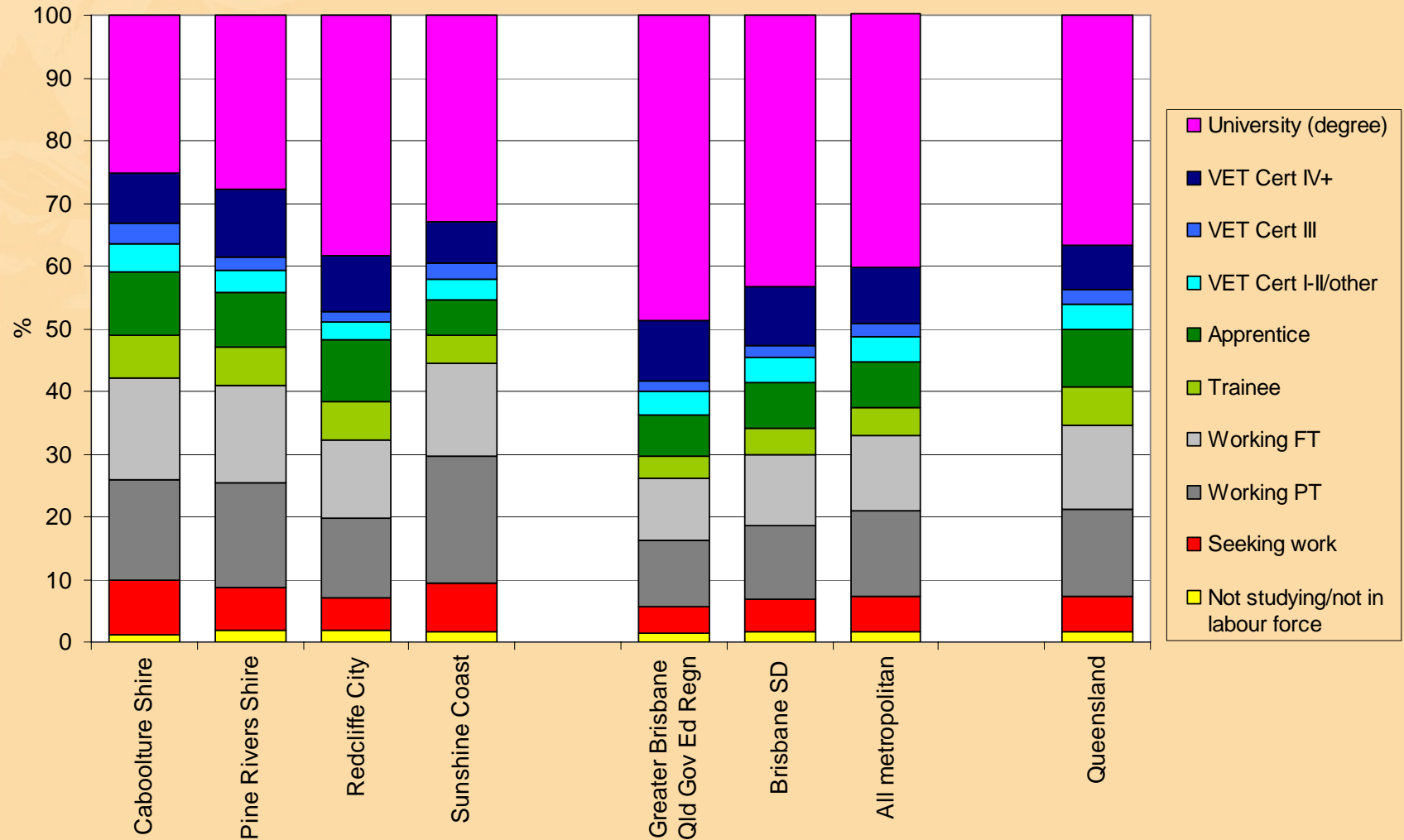
# Main Destinations, Queensland



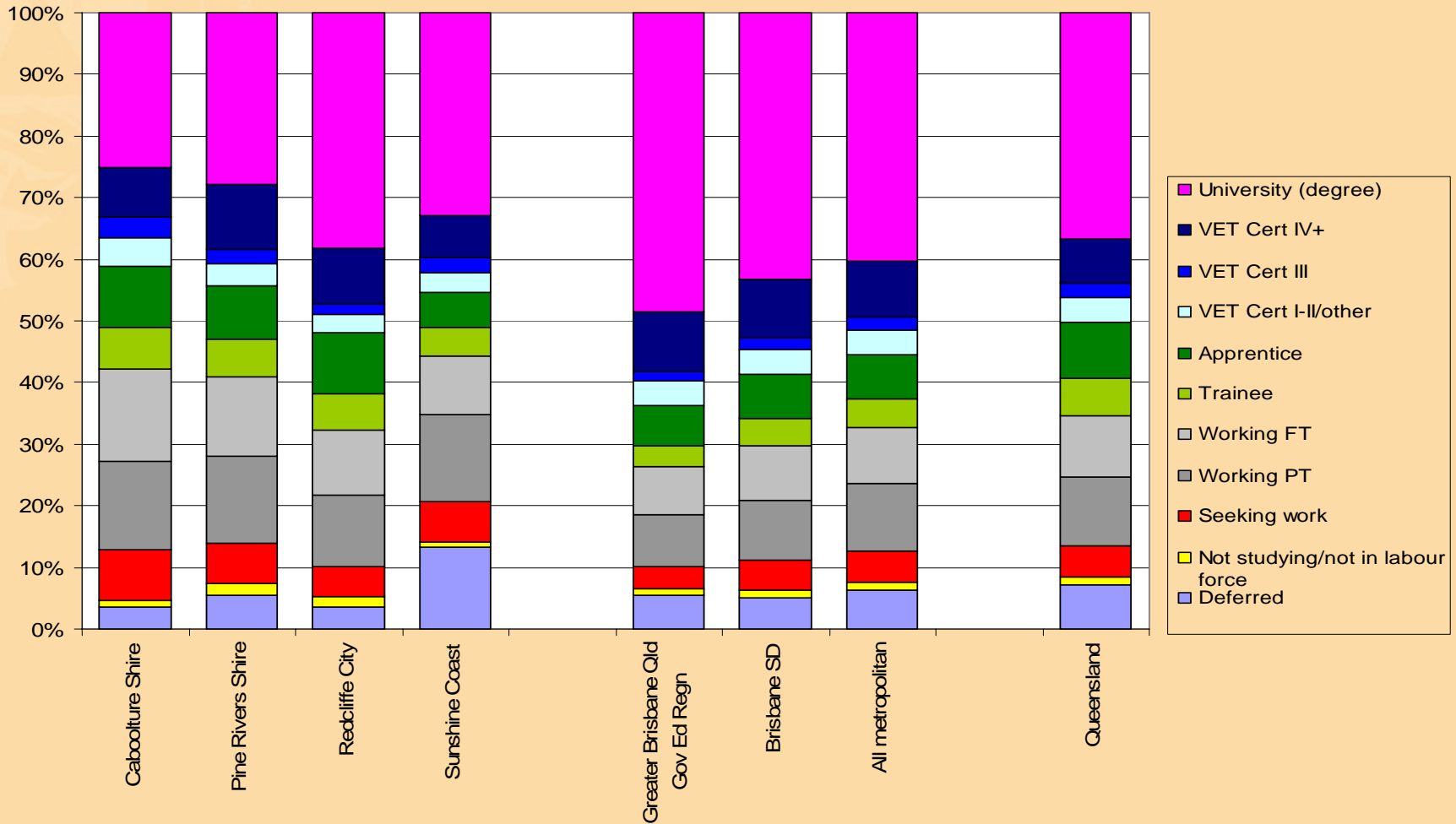
# Destinations by Queensland region



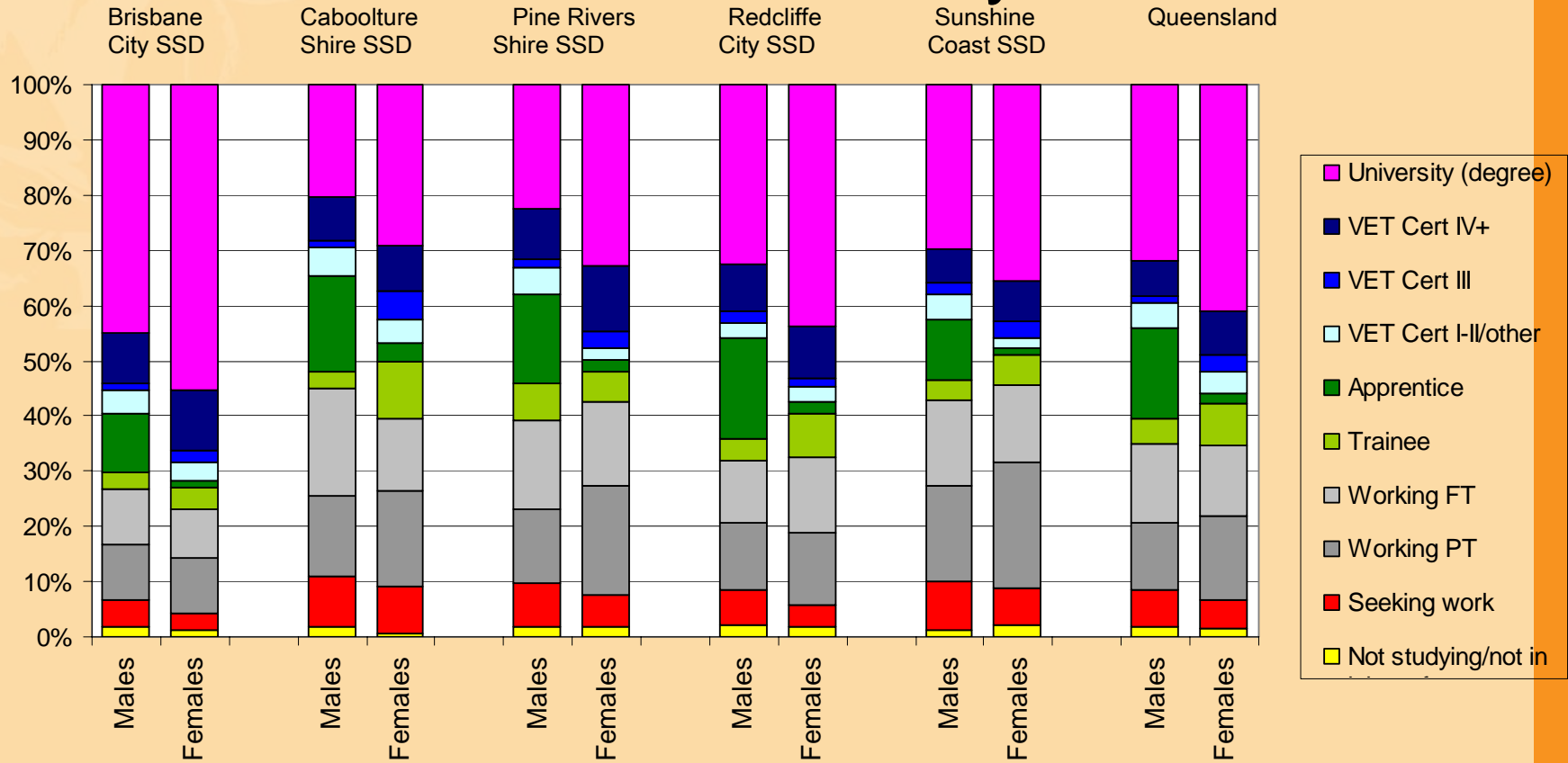
# Main destinations Brisbane North

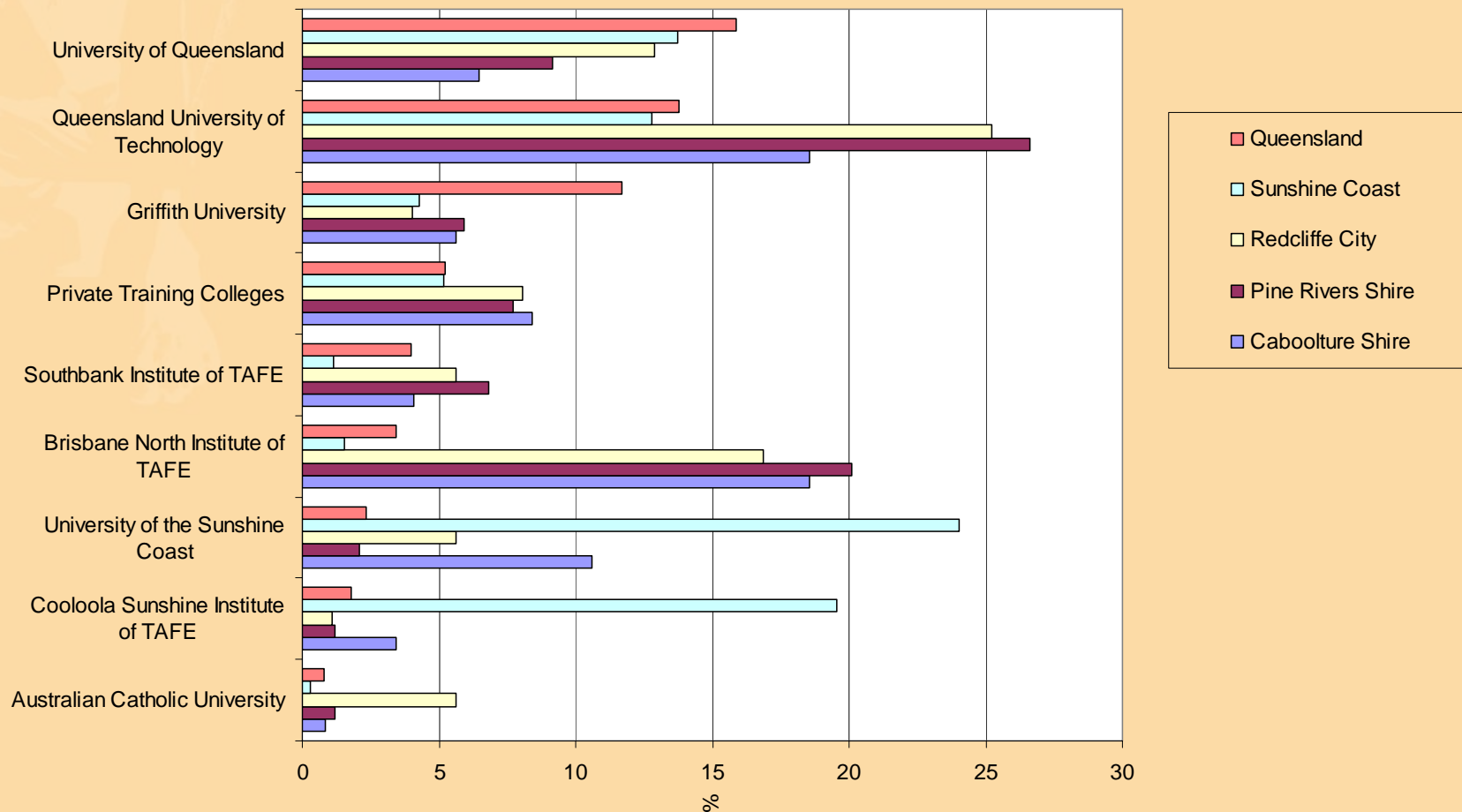

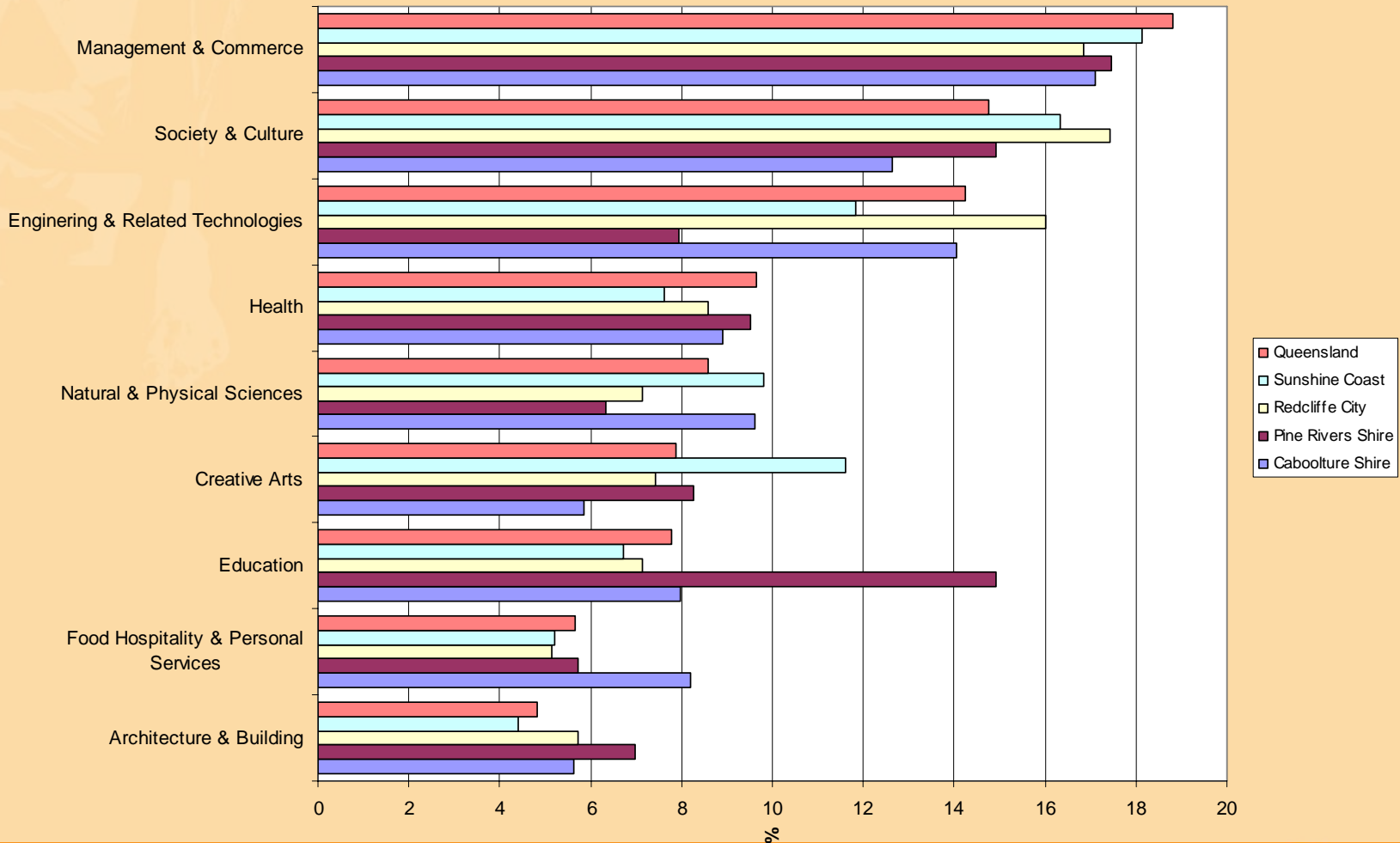

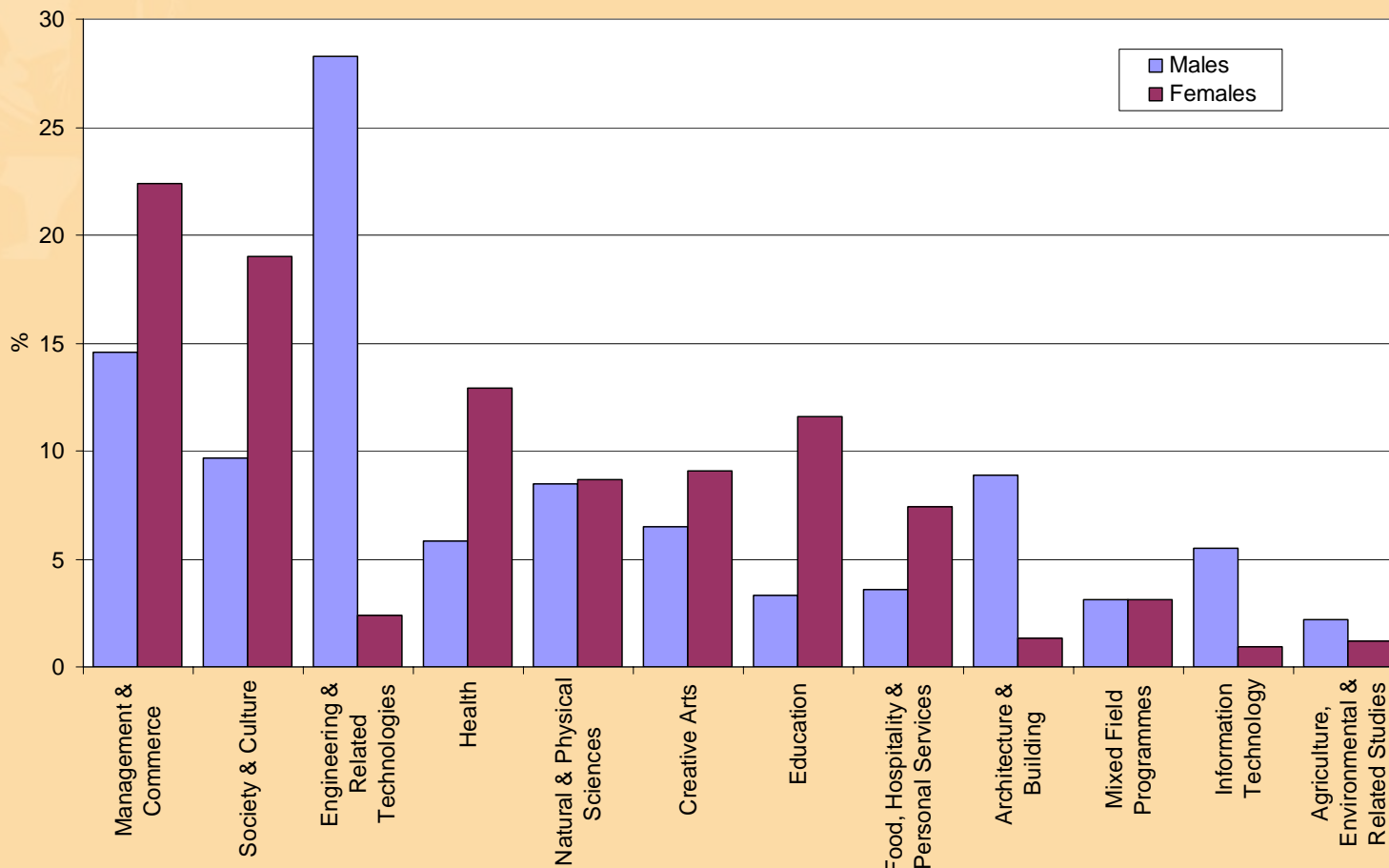


# Main post-school fields of study

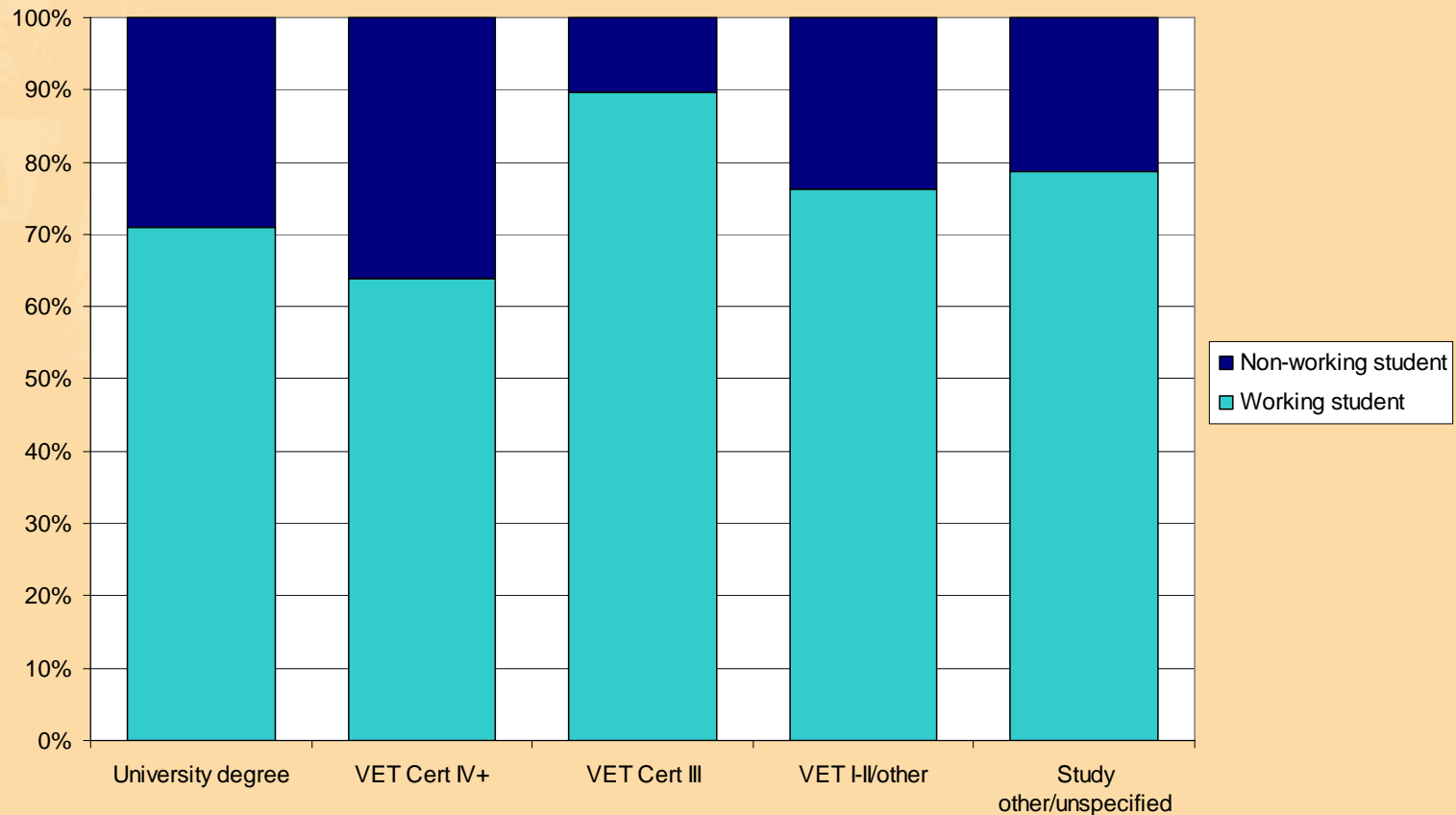




# Post-school field of study, by sex, Queensland

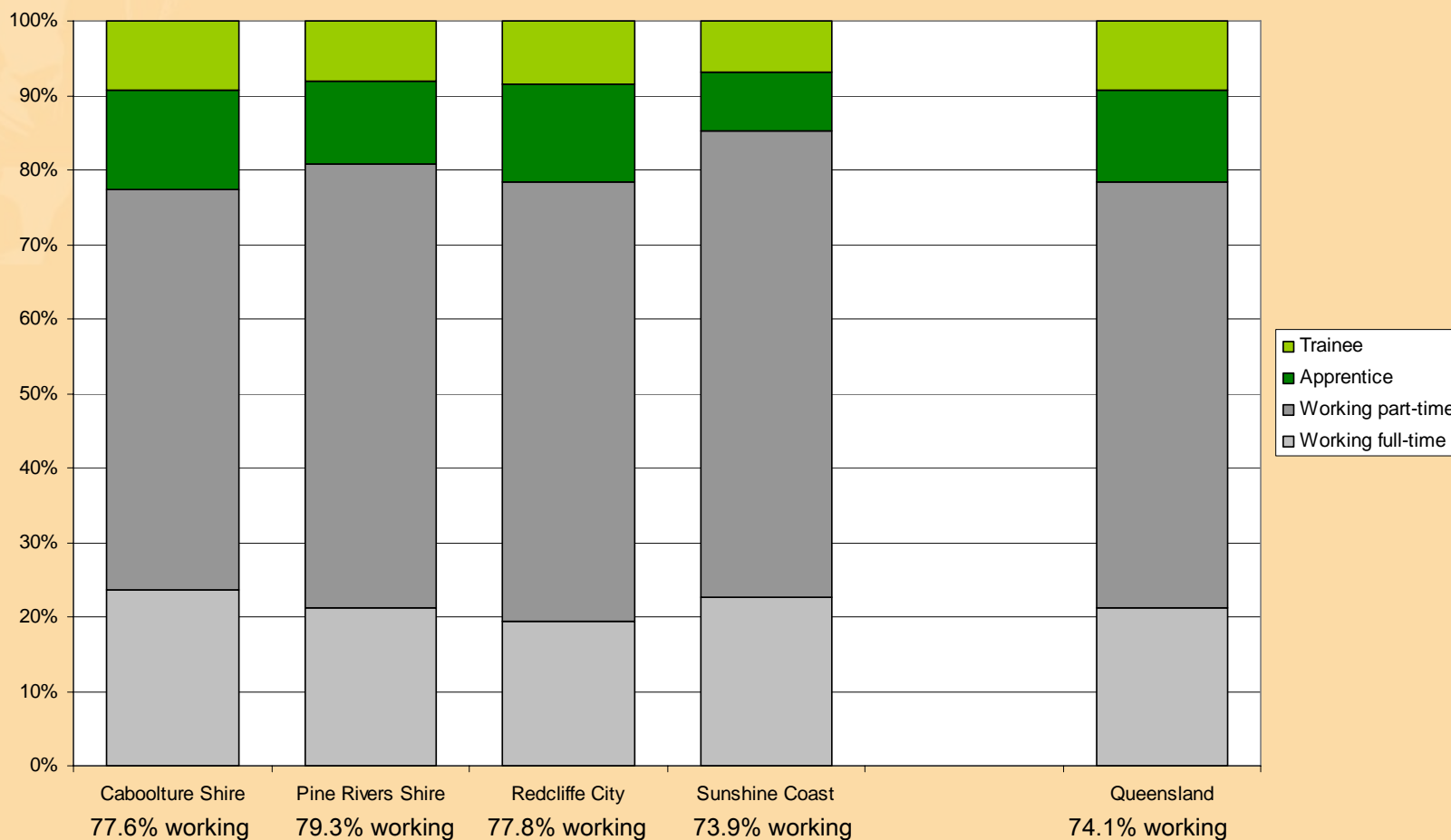


# Proportion of students working by level of study, Brisbane Statistical Division

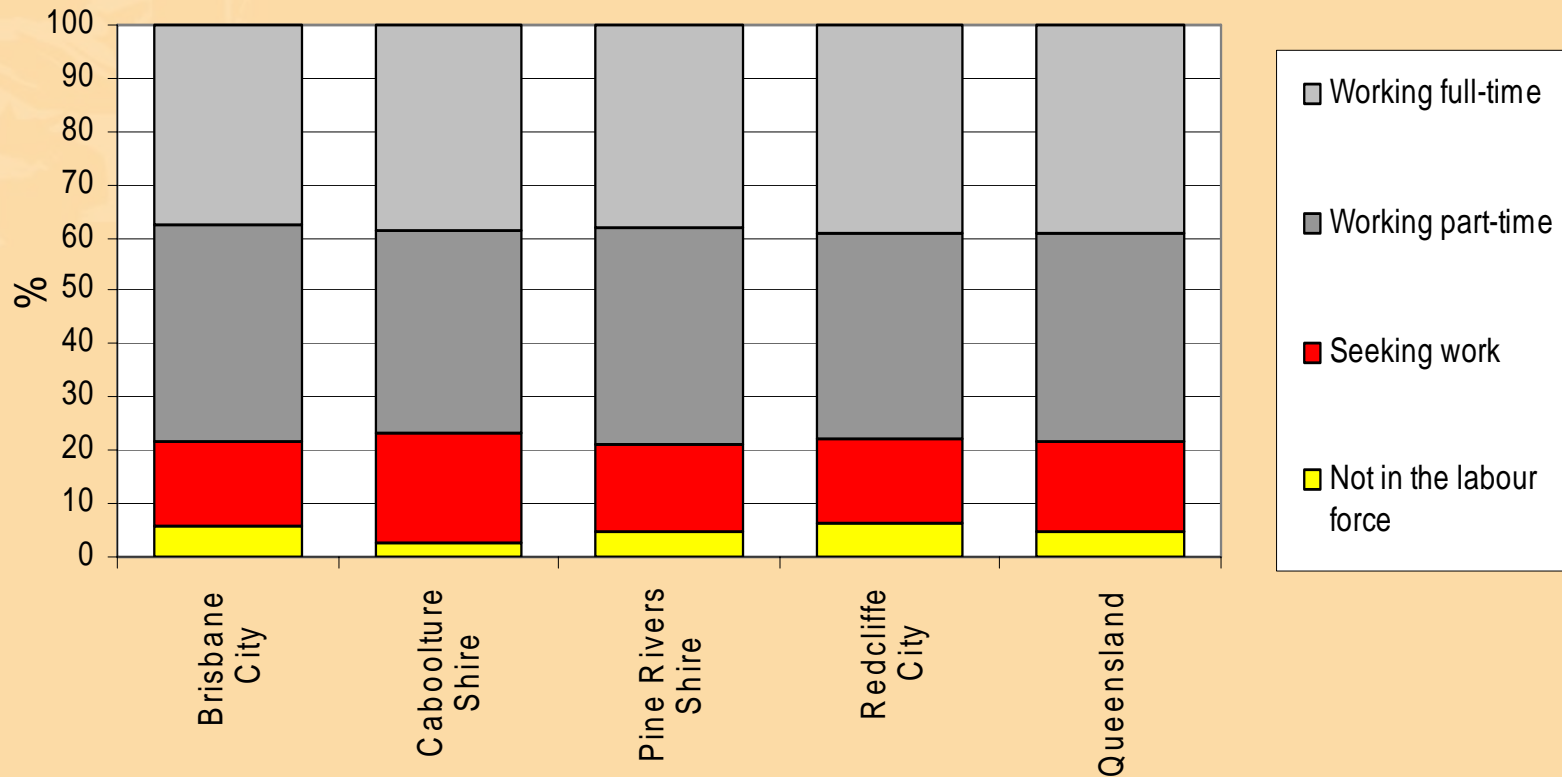

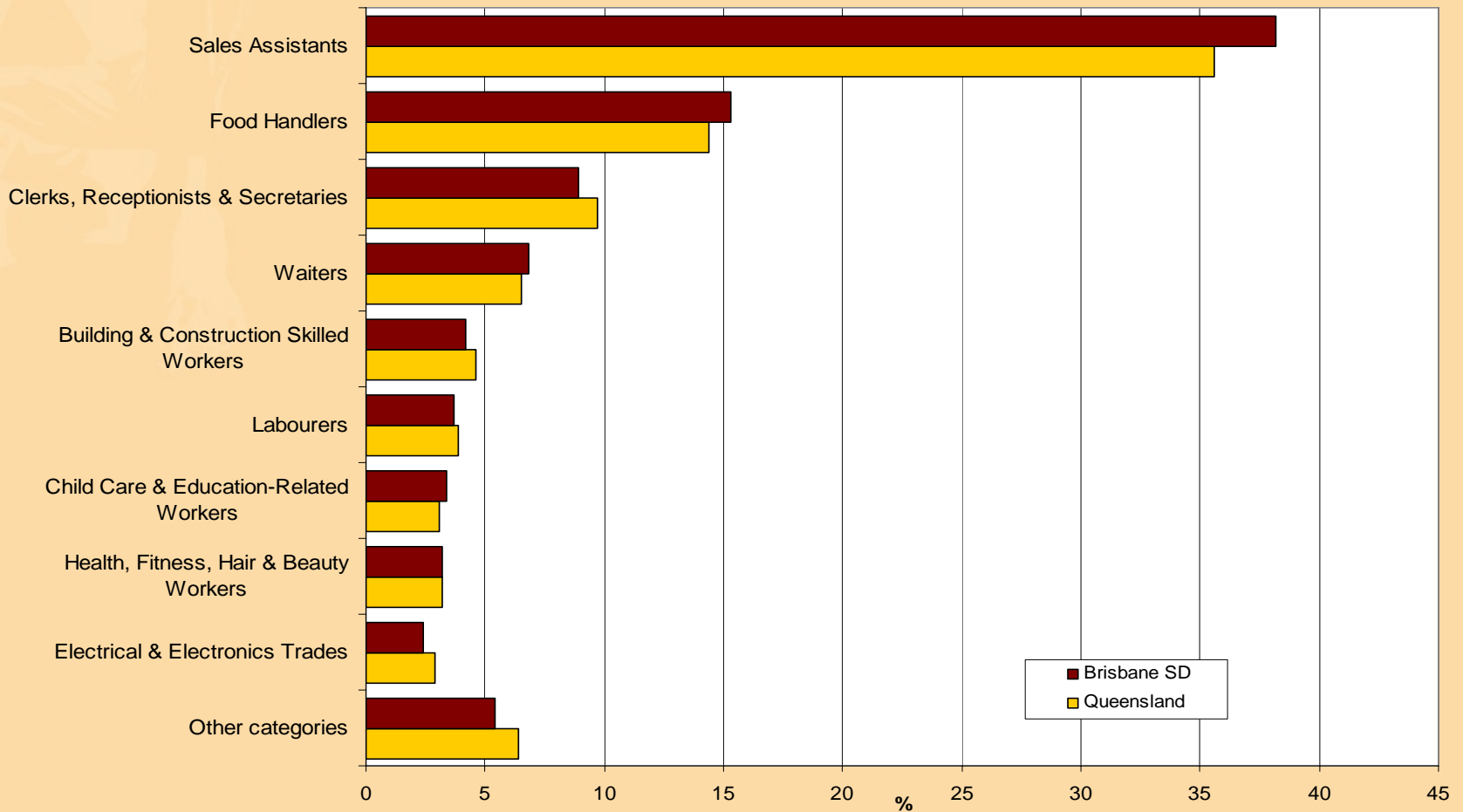
# Work destinations of all Year 12 completers



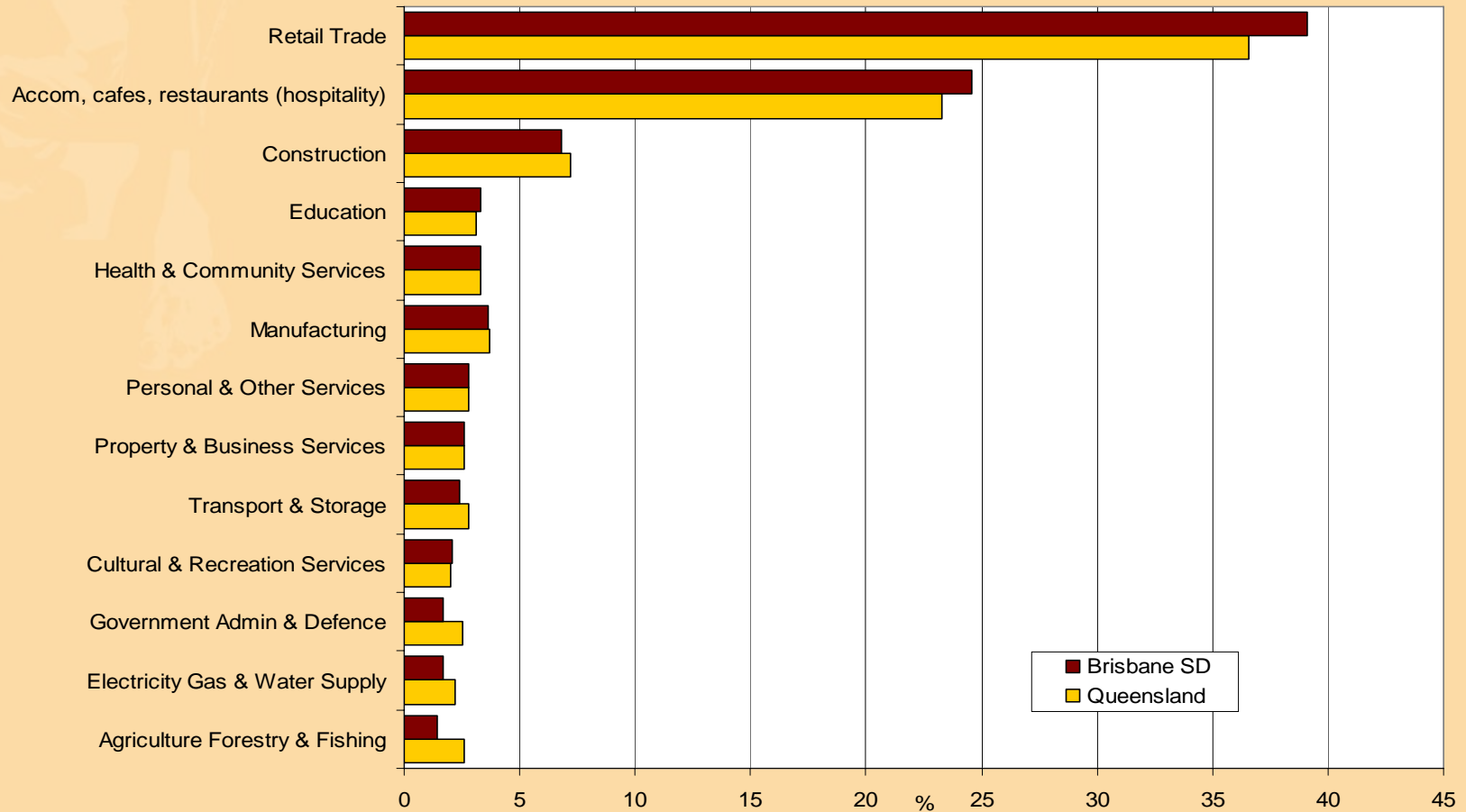
# Work destinations of Year 12 completers, not in education or training



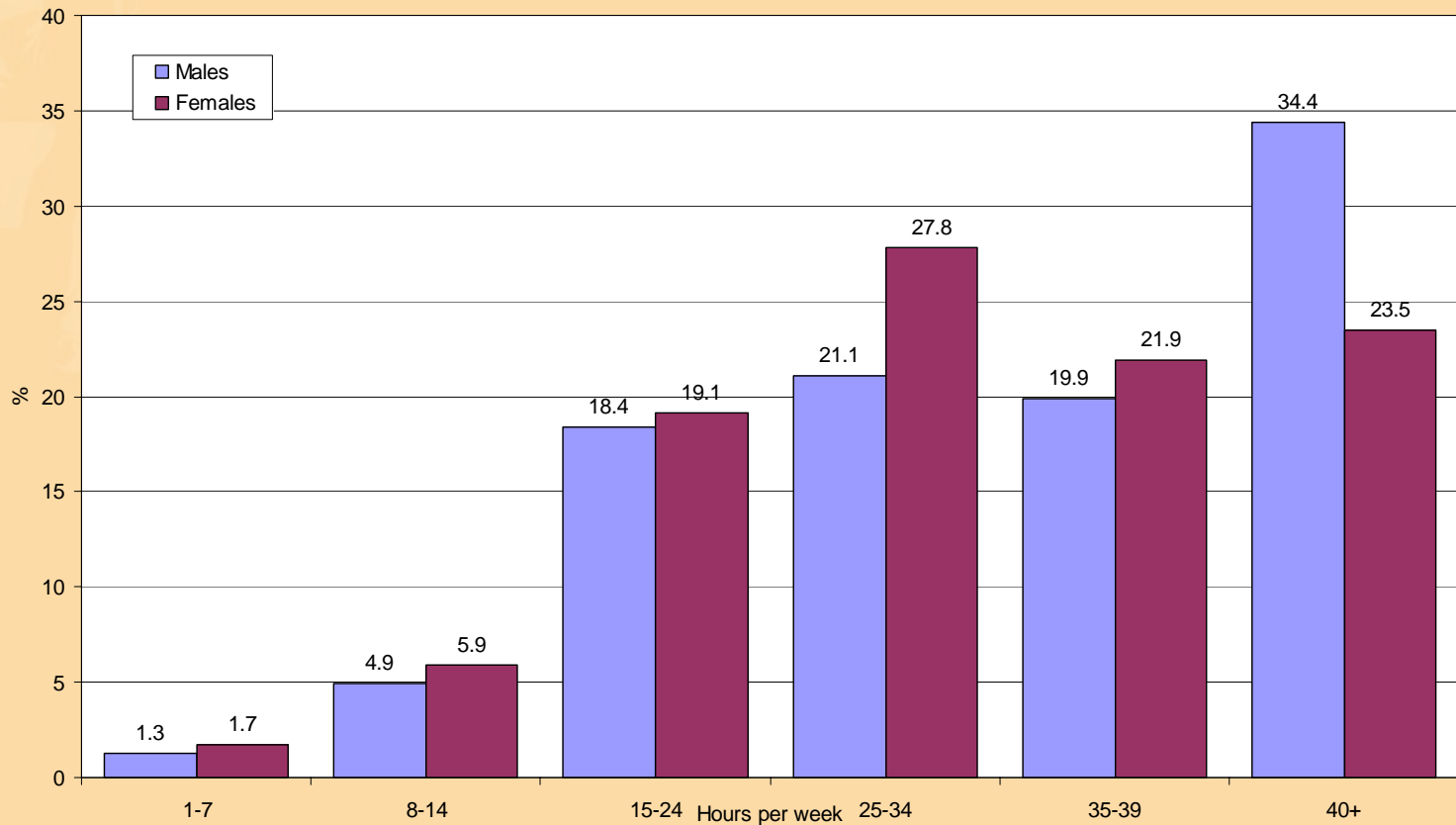
# Occupation of all Year 12 completers

# Hours worked by Year 12 completers, not in education or training

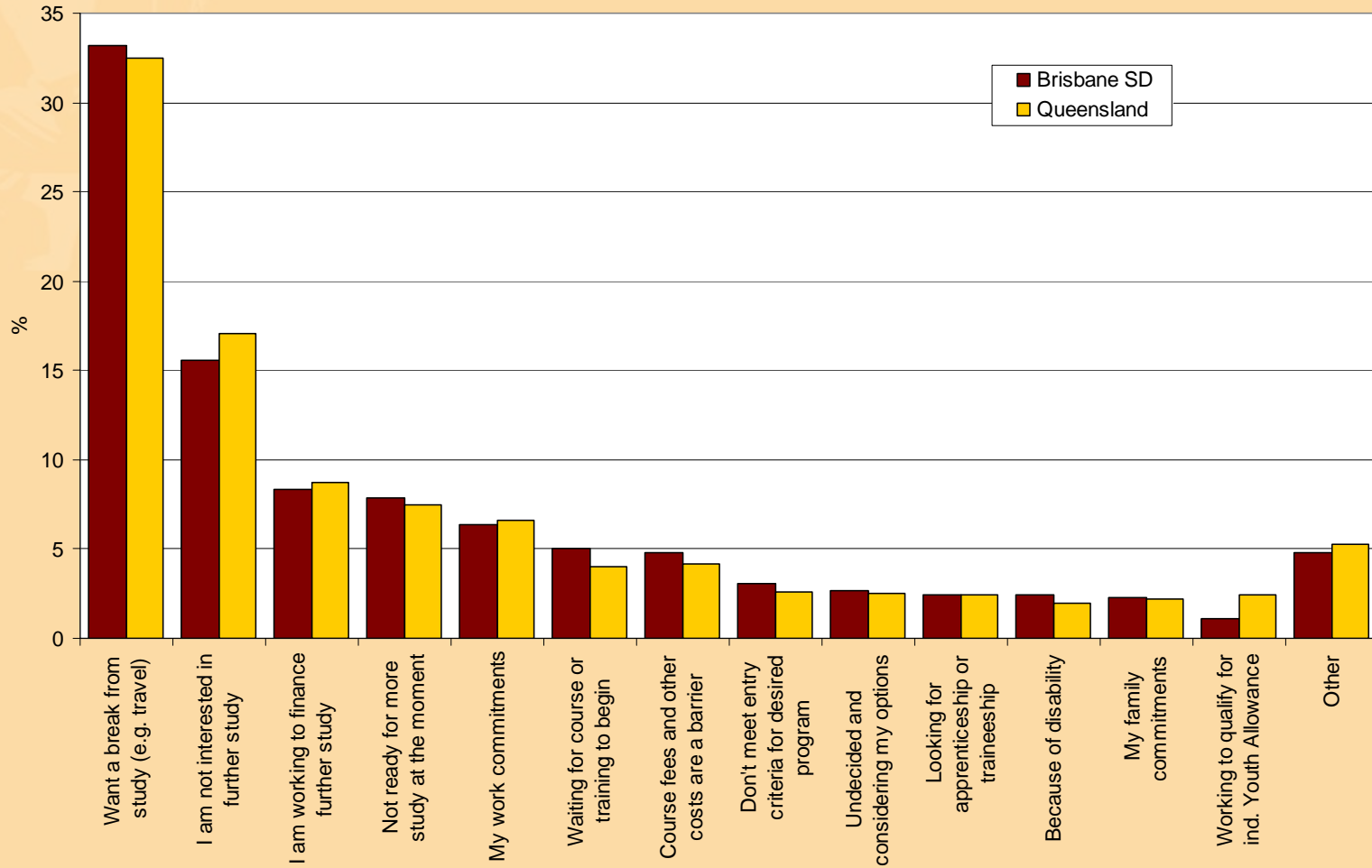




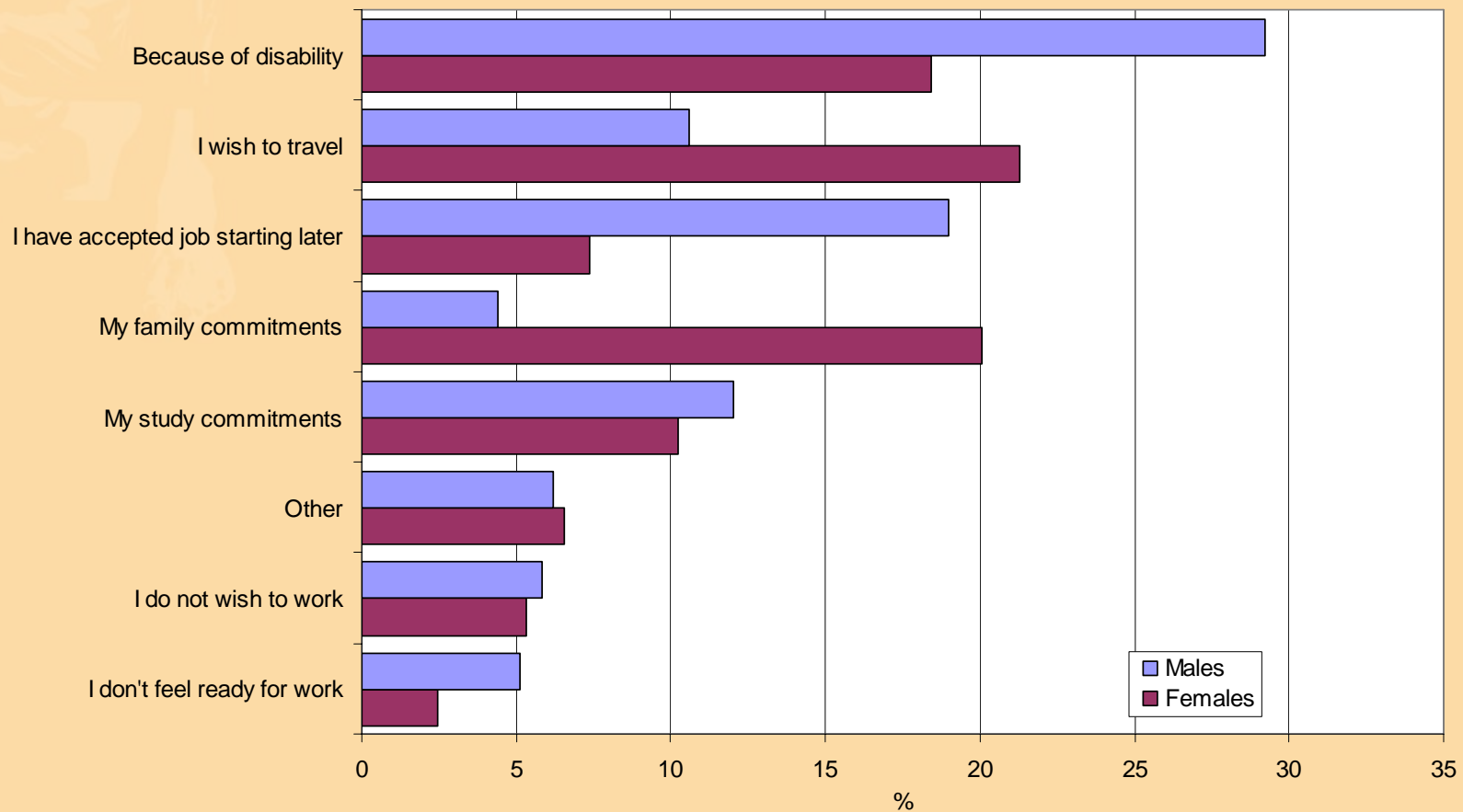

# Main reasons for not studying

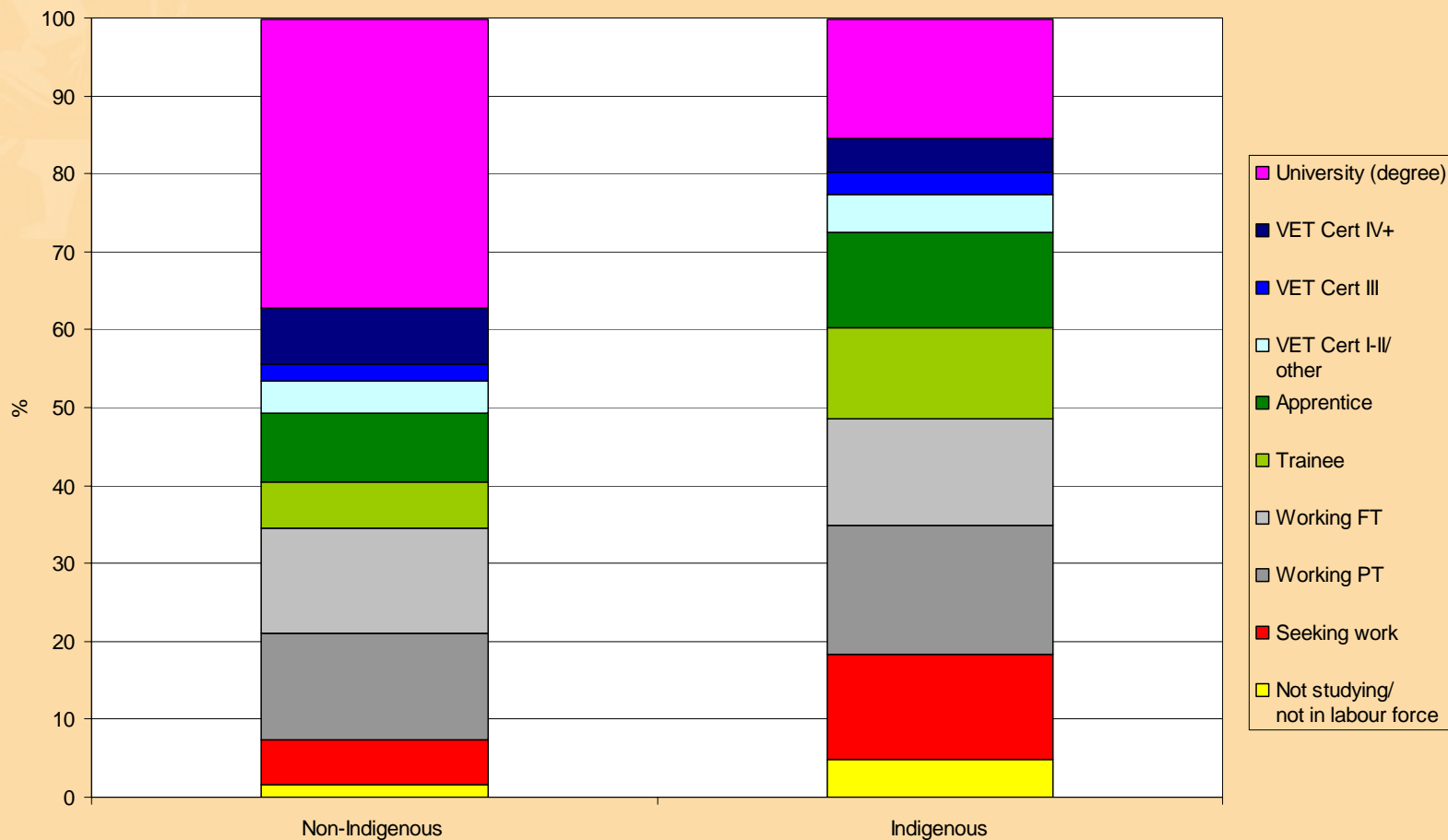


# Main reasons for not seeking work, Queensland

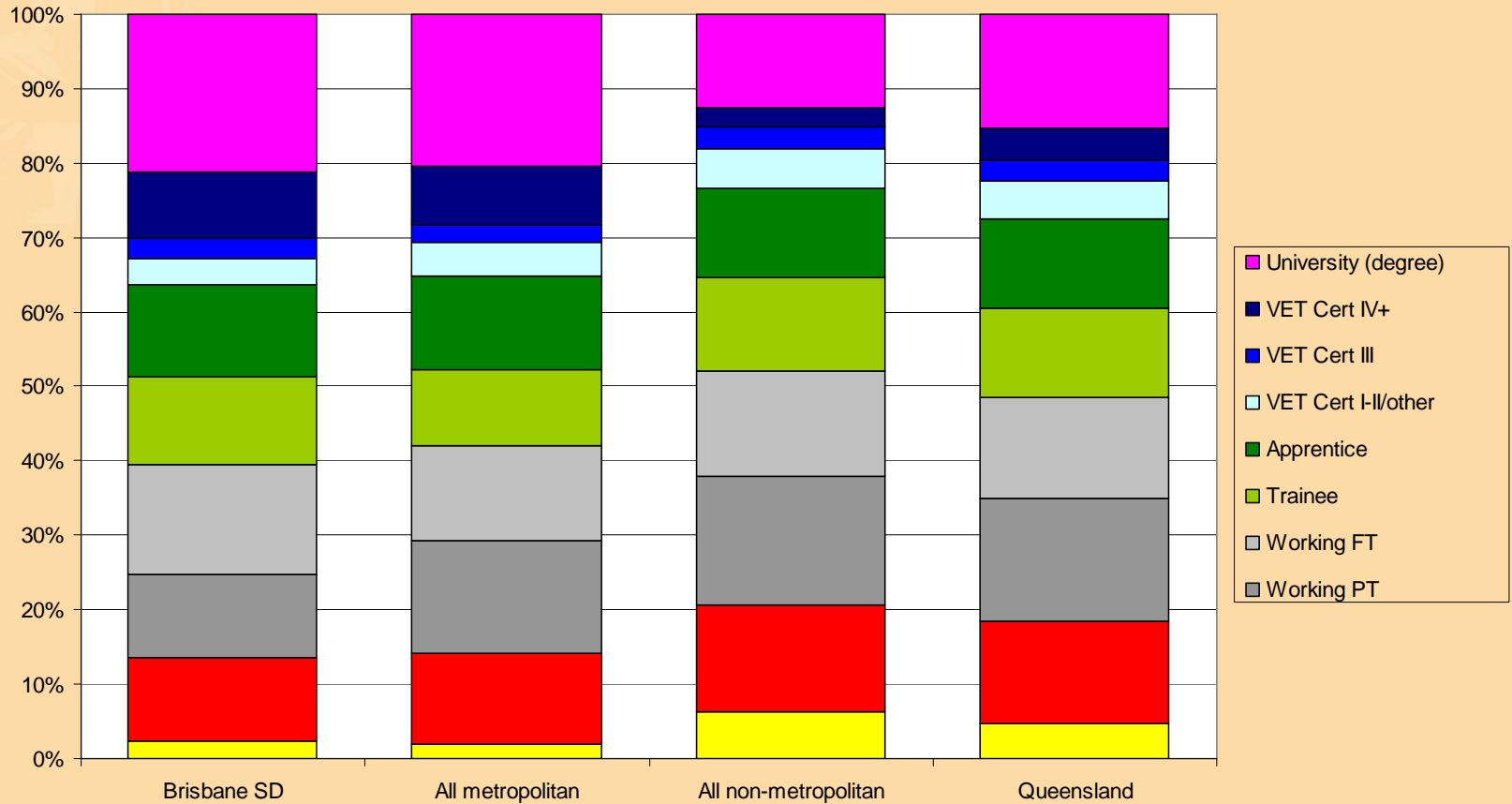

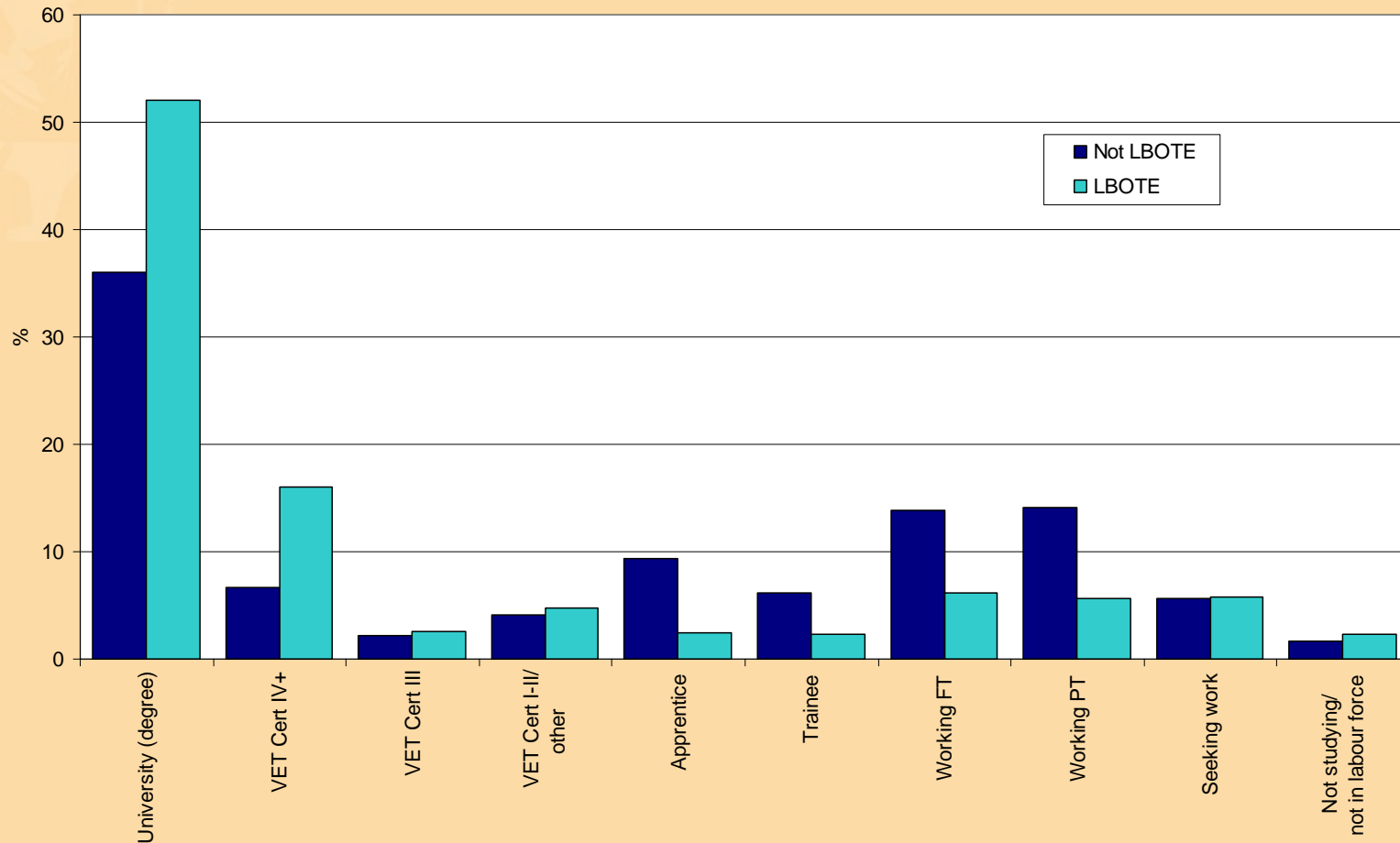
# Destinations by Indigenous status, Queensland



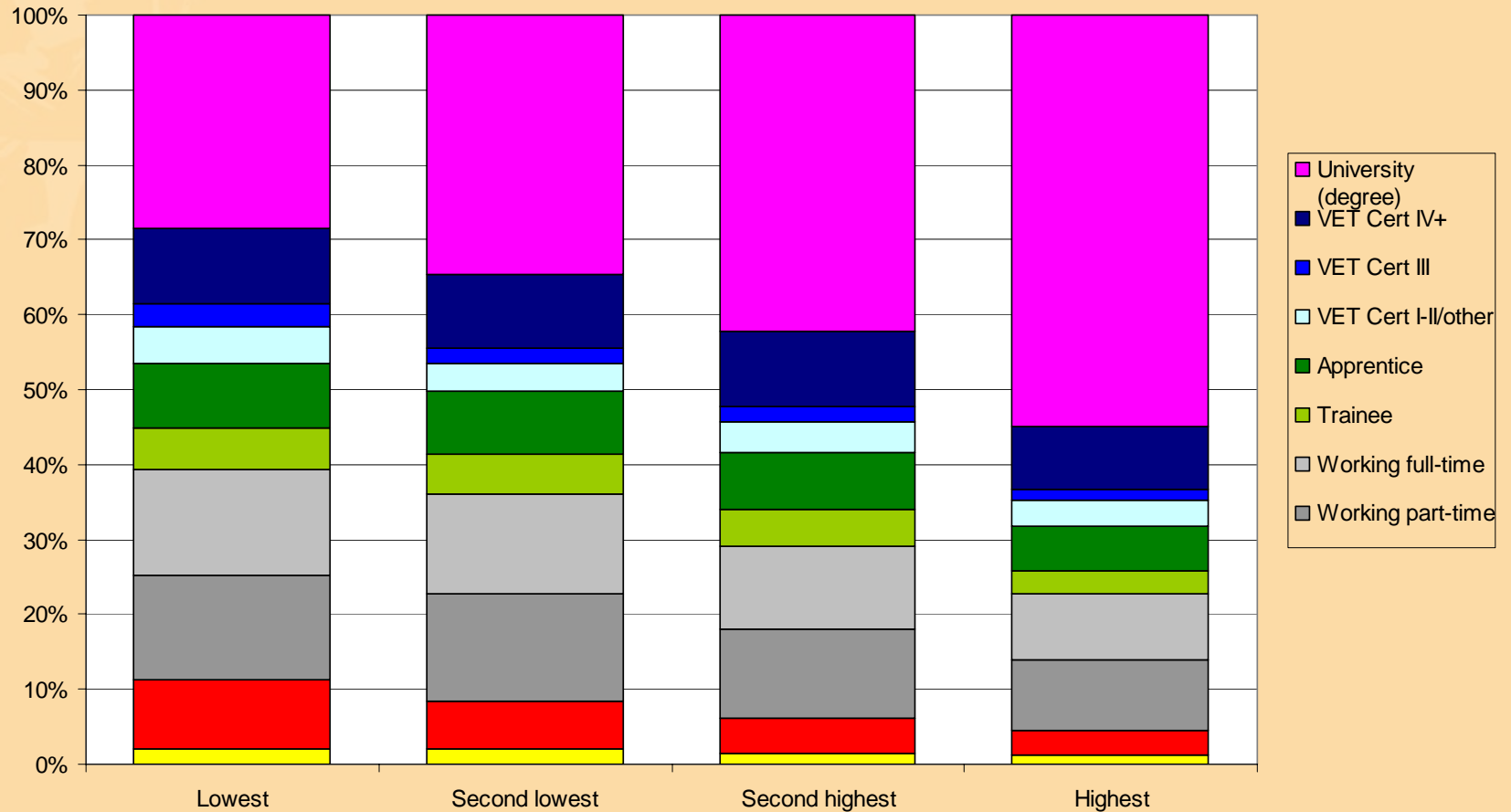
# Comparison of Indigenous destinations



# Destinations by LBOTE status, Queensland

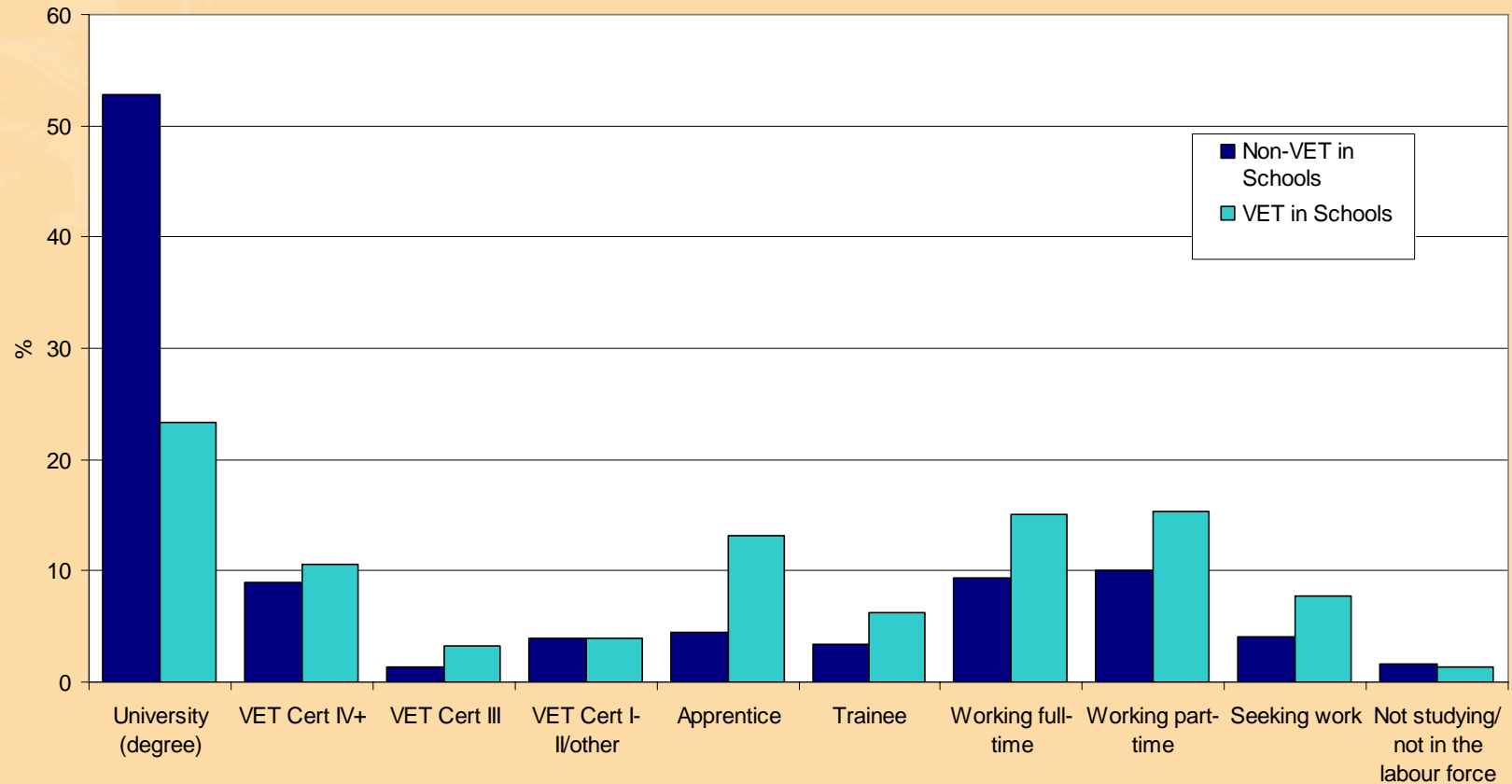


# Destinations by SES, Brisbane SD

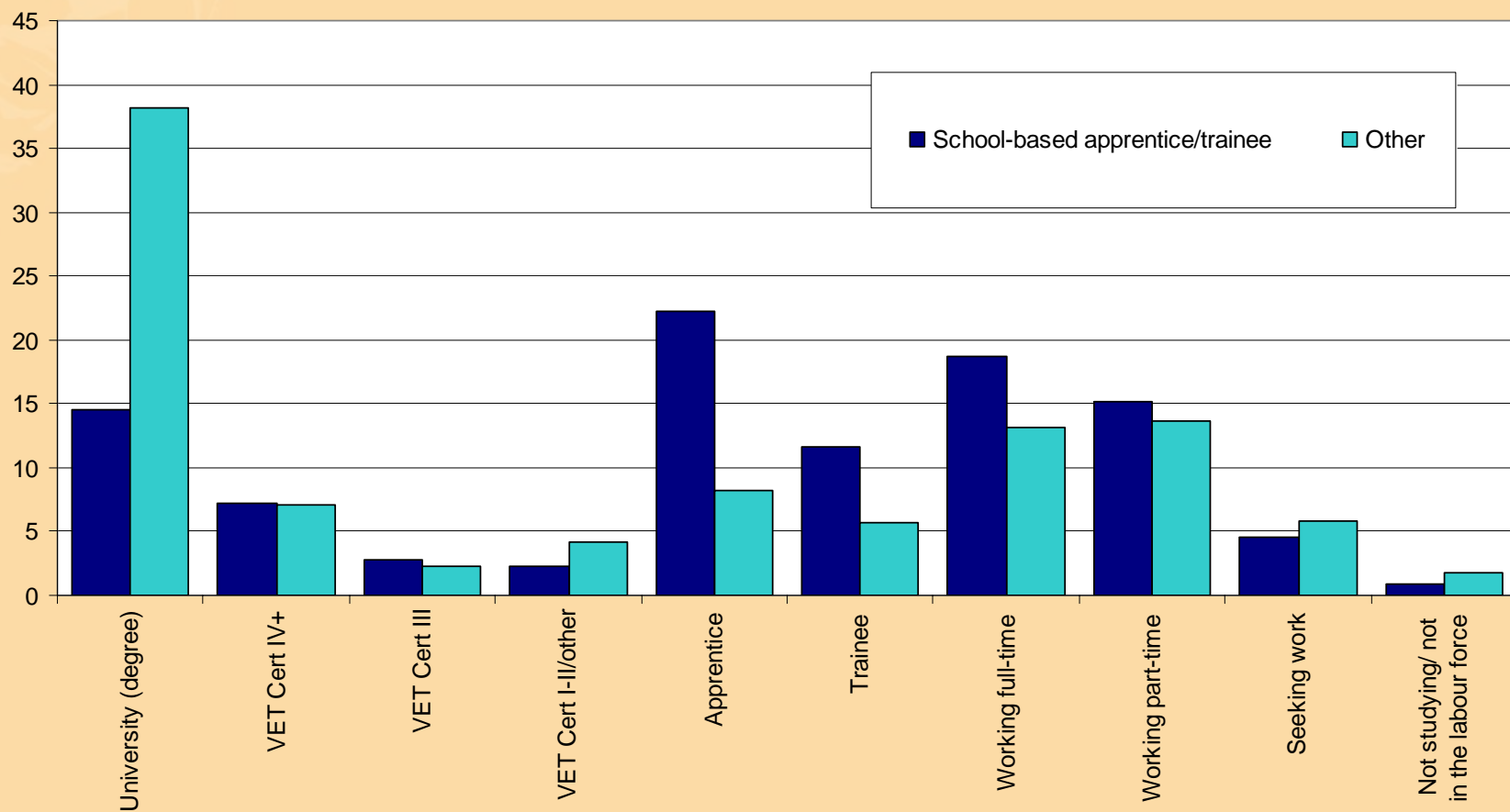




# Destinations by VET status, Brisbane SD
