Act for Kids has three SDSS teams, which are located in Brisbane, Townsville and North Coast.

Our trauma informed transdisciplinary teams support students, who have experienced trauma or are at risk, to keep safe, heal from trauma and lead happy lives. This work is completed in the school environment focusing on goals of access, participation and achievement in the curriculum. Act for Kids SDSS teams can provide the following services to eligible students and school staff:

- Consultation/capacity building
- Individual and group intervention with students
- Assessment and recommendations
- Professional development
- Support strategies

Act for Kids therapists understand that every student is different, with their own individual needs, interests, strengths and abilities. For students who have experienced harm or trauma, these experiences additionally impact how they can access, participate and achieve in the classroom. The role of our teams is to join with families/carers and schools to better understand individual students' needs, support in the identification of





barriers and provide consultation and therapy to support an increase in engagement and participation.

Autism Queensland provides specialist education and therapy services to support increased access to the curriculum, participation in learning alongside peers, and improved educational outcomes for autistic students. Support is provided by an interdisciplinary team of speech language pathologists, occupational therapists and specialist teachers with skills and knowledge in autism. In consultation with schools and education sector contacts, Autism Queensland will provide initial consultations, follow up session/s, video/teleconference support, individual and group educator coaching sessions and educator forums. The service also provides resources to support learning and an Education Support Line, accessible via telephone or email five days per week, which provides immediate access to information and advice for teachers, school support staff and parents.

Banana Shire Council's Community Resource Centre (CRC) therapy service offers speech language pathology, occupational therapy, physiotherapy and educator support to students in partnership with their education support team. This support includes mentoring, coaching, individual and group intervention





services, focusing program delivery in three areas:

- Individual school delivery of education and therapy supports to meet student goals.
- Multi school education and therapy intervention programs group program delivery and alternate venues to support students with similar goals but who attend multiple schools.
- Development and maintenance of a resource and specialised equipment library (including mobile library) to ensure contemporary, easily accessible resources and equipment to enable maximum use and access for trial and loan.

The services include occupational therapy, speech language pathology and physiotherapy. The key aim of the services is to work with schools to enhance the access, participation and educational outcomes of students with disability. This is achieved through student observation and assessment, collaborative goal setting and review with school teams, targeted short-term individualised and group interventions that are planned and delivered in conjunction with school staff, resource provision/trials and the provision of staff training and development to meet specific student/school needs.

Speech language pathology and occupational therapy services will be provided to eligible students in Prep to Year 2 who are deaf or hard of hearing. Services are provided to support students' engagement and participation in the curriculum. Following referral from a school, students will receive a block of speech therapy and/or occupational therapy with therapists visiting the school. Speech language pathology will focus on the areas of expressive and receptive language and literacy skills, and occupational therapy on fine motor skills, handwriting, sensory processing and behavioural regulation.

Services are responsive to the individual needs of students in the school setting and may include:

- Assessment and report
- Individual therapy aimed at meeting the student's individual needs as identified in the school referral
- summary reports following completion of the therapy block
- support to teachers in the development of individualised student programs
- the development of specific resources and programs
- consultation and collaboration with school staff and parents
- liaison with outside agencies

Down Syndrome Queensland is the state's peak body for intellectual disability. Our free SDSS service, known as ID:8 (IDEATE), supports schools with students who meet the SDSS eligibility criteria. Our expertise is in improving outcomes for students with Down syndrome, intellectual disability, Developmental Delay or Global Developmental Delay, or students with other complex profiles (with or without a formal diagnosis). Our statewide service will support students in metropolitan, regional, and remote schools. Educators are provided with support to identify and address potential barriers, enhance attendance and equitable participation alongside age peers, improve engagement and learning experiences, and assist students to achieve their individualised goals. We can provide support around communication, curriculum and assessment, engagement, personal and social development, fine and gross motor development, safety and self-care, and a range of other areas. Schools that engage in our ID:8 consultations are also eligible for a free one-hour professional development workshop for the whole school to upskill staff on understanding and supporting students with Down syndrome/intellectual disability.

Our SDSS service is provided by a collaborative team of registered teachers with experience and expertise in inclusive education and education for students with intellectual disability and complex profiles. Schools can access as many free consultations as required throughout the year, either in-person or online.

Therapy services are provided to the Granite Belt cluster of state and non-state schools including speech language pathology, occupational therapy and physiotherapy. The service uses a multidisciplinary approach to deliver therapy interventions, including supporting students to be able to access and participate in learning opportunities. The professional services include:

- The use of standardised and observational therapy assessments of students to determine current abilities of each student, prioritise needs and to ensure a service delivery based on student strengths. The assessment process is done in collaboration with people who know the student well e.g. educators, therapists and parents/carers.
- Consultation with carers, teachers, support staff and other specialists to determine, maintain and monitor effective individual curriculum plans and program plans.
- Design and implementation of therapy programs to enhance skills and/or make adjustments to
 equipment, curriculum or environments to ensure individual needs of students are catered for
 and suited to their context.
- Development and presentation of short, practical workshops for education staff to build their capability in meeting the needs of eligible students, including support for education staff to transfer workshop content into their planning and teaching.

The service empowers students with vision loss to achieve independence, participation, inclusion and wellbeing. Targeted therapy and supports for students living with vision impairment or blindness is provided state-wide. Programs are designed in collaboration with school support teams within the expanded core curriculum to enable each student to access, participate in, and achieve at school to their





full academic and social potential. Depending on the needs of the school and student, we can provide supports in person or via electronic means. Our programs include:

- Programs to enable access and mobility to and within school environments.
- Programs to support students in accessing learning materials and to maximise their ability to participate in classroom activities.
- Interactive information or development sessions to school staff or student groups to build school capacity and complement our service provision to support long-term academic outcomes for each child.
- Programs to support students' wellbeing around acceptance of vision impairment and blindness. Student wellbeing is crucial to promote participation in curriculum and social engagement at school.

Whilst we are well known for our trusted Guide Dogs, the services to schools through SDSS are through evidence-based therapy programs delivered by a team of specialists, which include orientation and mobility specialists, occupational therapists, assistive technology specialists, and psychologists.

Through our programs and support, we complement school services through the expanded core curriculum, enabling independence in students to promote ability, inclusiveness, understanding and acceptance of vision impairment and blindness.

The service provides support to eligible students who are deaf or hard of hearing and are transitioning from Hear and Say's early intervention program to formal education, currently supported for therapy through Hear and Say's targeted intervention program, or who are individually referred by a school. The service will provide targeted support as needed throughout the individual student's school years to improve their access to and participation in the curriculum and assist in optimising their educational outcomes. This is achieved through exposure to dedicated listening and spoken language intervention, as well as the provision of specialised support mechanisms to key personnel in targeted students' educational settings.

Following referral from a school, this service will be provided by listening and spoken language specialists, educational audiologists and/or occupational therapists carrying out on-site visits. The service includes:

- Meeting individual students needs and achieving goals outlined in the service request/referral.
- Assessment of the classroom environment, with recommendations to enhance listening and reduce barriers to access as appropriate.
- Hearing technology support and training to enable education personnel and student confidence with technology to maximise listening and learning.
- Enhancing outcomes for students who have additional delays in the areas of motor planning and sensory integration, by providing services for students and support to the parents and professionals involved in their care.
- The provision of professional development training opportunities for education personnel.

Language Disorder Australia Limited's School Support Services (SSS) team has been partnering for over 15 years with schools to enhance access, participation, and educational outcomes for eligible students. By working alongside educators, the SSS program assists schools in building their capacity to support students with diverse learning needs. Through identifying individual student needs and equipping educators with targeted strategies, SSS empowers schools in reducing barriers to learning and participation. SSS supports students with language difficulties, including students with Developmental Language Disorder or Language Disorder associated with other diagnoses, such as autism and intellectual disability, that impact students' access to the curriculum.

The SSS team consists of specialist inclusion educators, speech language pathologists, and a physiotherapist, delivering a range of services, including: informal multidisciplinary assessments to identify students' and schools' unique support needs, consultative meetings and collaborative goal-setting with school staff, provision of targeted recommendations, strategies and resources, individualised reporting, and capacity-building sessions and professional learning services for educators and school staff. These services complement existing school supports, ensuring that students with diverse learning needs can fully engage in their education. Through engagement with SSS, QLD schools can also freely access the Language Disorder Academy, an online professional development learning platform.

Muscular Dystrophy (Cairns, Toowoomba, Ipswich, Brisbane, Sunshine Coast, Gold Coast)

Muscular Dystrophy Queensland works in partnership with schools to provide physiotherapy and occupational therapy services for eligible students with muscular dystrophy and similar, rare, progressive, muscle wasting conditions. The service provides consistency throughout the students' schooling and as their conditions progress.

Services are provided through school visits, teleconferences and ongoing liaison with school support teams. The therapists work closely with the school support team in identifying barriers to learning, setting collaborative goals and providing educational supports, equipment prescriptions, input and tailored advice in response to the student's physical, cognitive and learning requirements.

Standardised assessments and a set of observations will track achievement of the student's specific goals, improved attendance, level of participation, and access to the curriculum and school environment.

School therapy services provided by Northcott include physiotherapy, occupational therapy and speech pathology. Therapists are experienced in working with children with a range of disabilities including physical disabilities, cerebral palsy, neuromuscular conditions, developmental delay, intellectual disability and autism. Therapists can provide support, information and advice to teachers in areas like communication, concentration, participation, and social engagement. Northcott SDSS funded therapists work holistically with school-based therapists to ensure approaches and goals are complimentary.





Services are carefully tailored to student and school needs. Examples of work with schools includes:

- Collaboration with school staff to set goals and measure outcomes
- Individual student observation, assessment, therapy and reports
- School programs and practical strategies
- Assistance with equipment prescription and accessibility advice

Supports provided are centred around student access to the curriculum and education facilities, maximising education and learning outcomes, and supporting personal development and independence in the school setting.

Royal Far West provides a multidisciplinary approach, including speech pathology, occupational therapy and psychology, for primary school children who are having trouble participating in school, or are struggling with curriculum access and engagement.

Service options for eligible children include:

- assessment (including reports with recommendations)
- individual therapy for children with specific needs
- small group therapy programs for children with similar needs
- consultative support for educators to support developmentally vulnerable children, develop individual learning plans
- professional development workshops for educators and other school staff

Services are delivered on-line (telehealth), and during scheduled in community visits to specific regions.

The service delivers Comprehensive Sexuality Education (CSE) in schools to eligible students with disability. Relationship and sexuality education is part of the Health and Physical Education curriculum from Foundation - Year 10 and part of the 21st Century Skills in the senior syllabus for Year 11-12.

Specialist educators support schools by facilitating tailored CSE at schools' request across all year levels. Education sessions not only support direct access to curriculum content for students, but it also supports social and emotional learning to better facilitate student engagement at school. Added benefits of CSE are that it facilitates inclusion for all students and provides teaching for practical life and social skills such as menstrual management, understanding rules about touch (and how to help- seek), safety online, and maintaining good sexual and reproductive health and safety of students. This service also allows for specialised education resources that support student learning in this area, many of which are developed in conjunction with school/student consultation.

Our therapists work with education teams to identify and implement any adjustments that may be required to support each student's learning and participation. We also provide training to education teams to best support the individual needs of each child.

We provide this support through our dedicated teams of:

- Occupational Therapists we can help with organisational skills, routines, emotions and behaviour technology, fine motor skills including writing, strengthening interpersonal skills to improve classroom engagement including interaction with peers, attention to tasks and problem solving. We also support specific equipment adjustments enabling student access and participation.
- Speech and Language Pathologists supporting language, speech, alternative communication, social skills and literacy outcomes for students as well as advice for mealtime support.
- Physiotherapists supporting participation in the classroom, physical education and activities through adjustments to programs and equipment advice.
- Behaviour Support Practitioners supporting student's ability to participate in the classroom and activities through consultation, assessment and advice on behaviours of concern.
